The schedule for the summer session is as follows: Registration for first term, June 13; last day to register for credit, June 15; last day to register for National Teacher Examination, June 17; close of the first term, July 16; registration for the second term, July 18; last day to register for credit, July 20; last day to register for National Teacher Examination, July 22; administration of the National Teacher Examination, August 13; close of the second term, August 19. Commencement will be held on the evening of August 18.

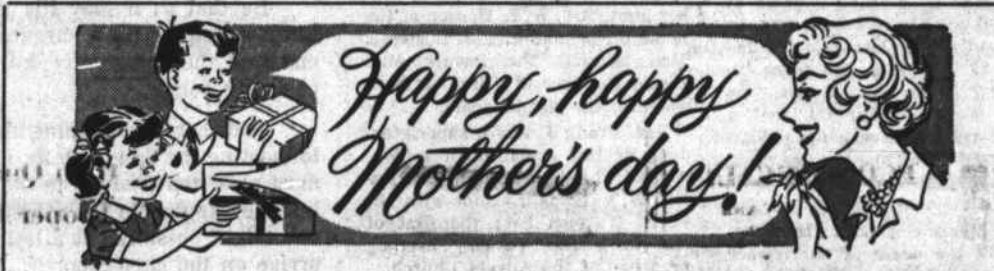
