All of our larger cities employ city managers and some of them also have the services of highly trained city planners. While the majority of city managers are planning for the future with vision and courage, they spend too much time correcting costly errors which were caused by lack of planning in the beginning.

But what about our counties? Are we preparing for the "population explosion?" Will your county be prepared to accept new industries? Provide for agricultural pursuits? Make desirable home Senior Luther League at 7:00 sites available for people who will soon tire of knocking elbows in congested areas of population?

As far as I know, there are few, if any, counties who are giving the planning problem the attention it deserves. Wake county is now toying with the idea, due, primarily, I expect, to the rapidly expanding Research Triangle. Why must we be prodded into these things? Why is it that most of our cities and towns grow faster than the services provided by city government? Will we ever learn or will we continue

to stumble along? What about water? There is no question but that water will be the limiting factor in the planning and development of all cities and

counties in North Carolina. In December, 1958, I devoted my column to the importance of careful planning and cited the experience of Macon county, Illinois, in this connection. They made countywide plans for: Agriculture, residential, local business, commercial, light industry and heavy industry.

FARM CENSUS NOTE

FARM CENSUS. Each farm owner shall prepare a list of the acreage of each crop grown, including tenths of acres of truck. The list should show the total acres cultivated by the owner, also the acres cultivated by all tenants on each separately recognized farm, the acres in improved pasture, woodland, idle and other lands. He shall be prepared to report the number of bearing fruit trees, the numbers of livestock of breeding age, number of hogs sold or slaughtered during past 12 months, and number of chicken. This information is kept confidential and has no relation to taxes. Its purpose is for agricultural education, economic analysis and safer guldance of county agents and farmers generally.
