

Ocracoke Island Ferry Not For Travelers In Big Hurry

The ferry "Sea Level" is plying again between Ocracoke Island, on North Carolina's Outer Banks, and the mainland port of Atlantic at the east coast terminus of U. S. Highway 70—but it is not for people in a hurry.

Making one round-trip daily, the ferry is operated by the State of North Carolina on a "first come-first served" basis. There are no reservations. Already this year, cars have been left at the dock for lack of space aboard. Capacity of 22 cars is reduced when boat trailers or trucks are aboard.

The Ocracoke-Atlantic ferry was never intended for rapid transit. Life is leisurely on the Outer Banks, and the Cape Hatteras National Seashore, stretching from south of the Nags Head resort to Ocracoke, will keep a great area of these off-shore islands in their original state of sand dunes and uncluttered beaches.

Vacationists planning to use the ferry to avoid dead-ending on Ocracoke after visiting Hatteras should allow for the possibility of staying over a day or two when traffic is heavy on this new Pamlico Sound route. There are comfortable overnight accommodations both on Ocracoke and in Atlantic and nearby Sea Level and Cedar Island. Fishing and sightseeing trips can be arranged quickly by those waiting over for the next
