

Miss Allgood Named Head Home Ec. Dept.

Miss Mary Brown Allgood has been named head of the home economics department at Appalachian State Teachers College, according to Dr. W. H. Flemmons, president of the college.

The new home economics department head, who assumes her duties on September 1, comes to Appalachian from Pennsylvania State University where she is professor of consumer services in the college of home economics.

Miss Allgood has been a member of the Pennsylvania State faculty since 1942.

She took a leave of absence during 1956-57 to lecture at the University of Helsinki, Finland, as a Fulbright Lecturer.

She conducted commercial TV programs in Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Wheeling.

In the summer of 1949 Miss Allgood taught household equipment at Teachers College, Columbia University. She taught demonstration techniques at Simmons College in the summer of 1949.

Miss Allgood's past positions also include home economics teacher, Clifton Forge, Va., 1930-32; home service director, Virginia distributor for General Electric, 1932-39; home service director, electric company, Findley, Ohio, 1939-40; home service director, Virginia Electric and Power Co., 1940-41.

She was educated at Petersburg (Va.) high school, 1922-28; Madison College, Harrisonburg, Va., B. S. in Home Economics, 1928-30; Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa, M.S. in Equipment, 1941-42.

Miss Allgood authored "Demonstration Techniques," Prentice-Hall, Inc., 1947. A second edition was published in 1959.

She is the recipient of the University Medal given by the University of Helsinki in 1957.

Miss Allgood is a member of Pennsylvania and American Home Economics Association, Kappa Delta Pi, and Delta Kappa Gamma, Educational Fraternities and Business and Professional Womens Club.

Father, Son Are Drowned

Lenoir—A 30-year-old man and his small son drowned Saturday in a tragedy which struck their fishing party at a mountain stream 15 miles west of here.

Coroner Claude Goble identified the dead as Hoover Jenkins and his son, Grant, 6.

Goble said the two, along with three other persons, were sitting on a large rock which sloped down into the water of the stream located a mile above Brown Mountain Beach. The Jenkins' minnow bucket slid down the rock into the water and the child, in grabbing for it, lost his footing and also slid into the water.

Goble said Jenkins went in after the child and succeeded in getting him on his back, but could not reach the bank. The two went down together, although friends on the bank attempted to reach them with fishing poles to lead them ashore.

The bodies were recovered shortly afterwards and artificial respiration was given for half an hour. They then were taken to a hospital here, but were pronounced dead.

Lenoir, June 16—Funeral services were held Thursday at 10 a. m. for Alfred Donald Isaacs, 70-year-old resident of 221 Plaza Circle who died Tuesday at his home. He had been in declining health for five years.

Rev. Bernard Tuttle and Rev. Lawrence Miller officiated at the rites at Crestview Baptist Church. Burial was in Blue Ridge Memorial Park.

A retired coal miner, he was born May 17, 1891 in Watauga County and was a son of the late Alfred Donald and Addie Mast Isaacs.

Surviving are his wife, the former Nora Banner; two daughters, Mrs. S. B. Stevens of Memphis, Tenn., and Mrs. A. L. Aldridge of Fort Worth, Texas; three sons, Harry Isaacs of Ragland, W. Va., and Bill Isaacs and Fred Campbell, both of Lenoir; one brother, Charlie Isaacs of Newton, W. Va.; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Miller of San Diego, Calif., Mrs. Bessie Brown of Charlotte and Mrs. Mattie Hodges of Boone; eleven grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.
