

State Bond Proposal Is Issue At Polls Tuesday

(Continued from page one) the following proposals when they go to the polls Tuesday:

1. The issuance of two million eight hundred fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$2,858,000.00) Capitol Area Building Bonds of the State of North Carolina for construction of needed buildings for State purposes in the Capitol area.

2. The issuance of one million one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$1,110,000.00) State Training Schools Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for needed capital improvements at the State's correctional schools.

3. The issuance of thirty-one million eight thousand dollars (\$31,008,000.00) State Educational Institutions Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for needed capital improvements at the State's educational institutions.

4. The issuance of one million four hundred eighty-three thousand dollars (\$1,483,000.00) Community College Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for grants-in-aid for community college capital improvements.

5. The issuance of two million five hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$2,560,000.00) Archives and History and State Library Building Bonds of the State of North Carolina for construction of a building to house the Department of Archives and History and the State Library.

6. The issuance of thirteen million five hundred thousand dollars (\$13,500,000.00) State Ports Bonds of the State of North Carolina for the construction, acquisition and improvement of State Ports facilities.

7. The issuance of seven million three hundred ninety-six thousand dollars (\$7,396,000.00) State Mental Institutions Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for the construction of needed capital improvements at the State's mental institutions.

8. The issuance of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) Hospital Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for the purpose of providing funds for participation by the State through the Medical Care Commission in local hospital construction.

9. The issuance of nine hundred sixty-one thousand dollars (\$961,000.00) Natural Resources Conservation and Development Bonds of the State of North Carolina for capital improvements in the conservation and development of natural resources of the State.

10. The issuance of two hundred eighty-nine thousand dollars (\$289,000.00) State Agriculture Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for capital improvements at the State's agricultural research stations.

PARCEL POST UPPED

Postmaster General J. Edward Day has proposed a plan to raise parcel post rates by about 6 per cent. This will include a revision in size and weight limits on parcels and increase mail-catalogue rates by 13.8 per cent.

This would be another step in the Post Office Department's campaign to reduce its annual deficit of about \$840,000,000. The plan is subject to approval by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Lundean Dies

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tivity came naturally for Mr. Lundean, who drove a six-horse hitch to a stage coach in his youth in the Northwest and came East to ride with the 101 Wild West Rodeo in New York City.

Born in Council Bluffs, Iowa, Mr. Lundean was reared in Wyoming where he learned to paint the people and the animals with a realism which caught the imagination of the eastern art critics. Mr. Lundean was internationally famous for his portrayal of horses of all types, the western cow pony, Indian pony, polo ponies and thoroughbred horses. His interpretation, knowledge and great love for the horse was unequalled.

After his discharge from the army after World War I, he took courses in art and studied journalism at the University of Missouri before going to New York where he studied with George Luks and Bordman Robinson. Other great artists took a hand in Mr. Lundean's development as he toiled with brushes and palette, and in his spare time covered sports events for newspapers as a means of livelihood.

With canvas and paint he recorded the wild beauty of the storm-tossed seas from a Gloucester fishing boat and painted the Pennsylvania coal miner and picturesque barns of the state. He covered county fairs for Fortune Magazine and also painted barns in New England and the South.

The South became his summer home after his marriage to Miss Marjorie Daingerfield, daughter of the famous New York artist, Elliott Daingerfield. From the majestic panorama seen from the Daingerfield home he painted the fantastic beauty of the Blue Ridge mountains in all their moods.

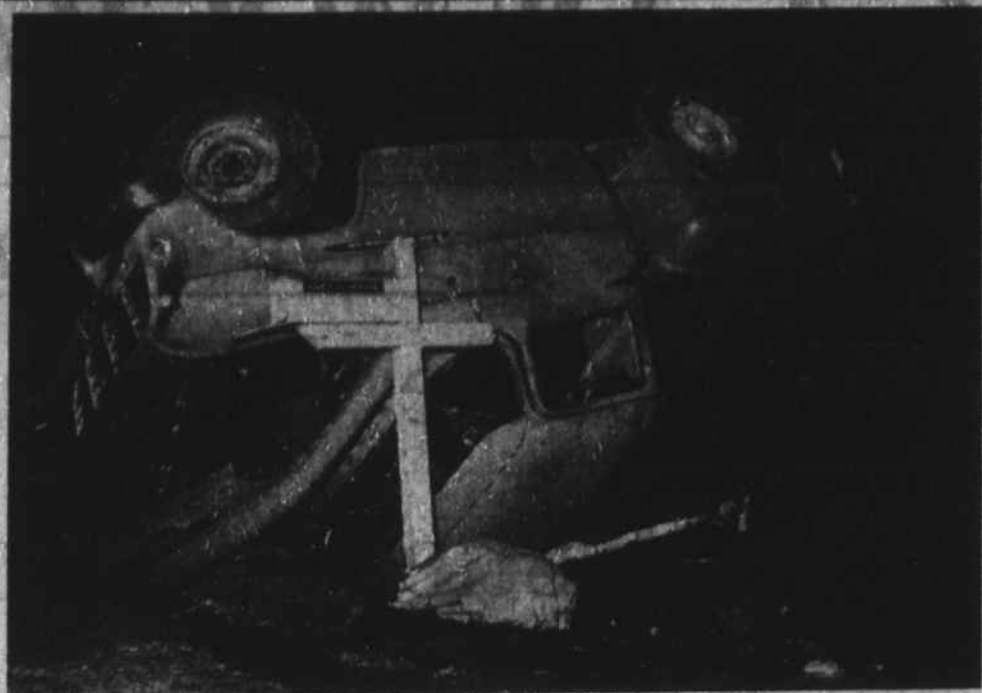
Mr. Lundean was famous for his paintings of hunting scenes in Pennsylvania, in New England and Virginia. His paintings are in the collections of the Whiteneys, the Harrimans, the Plunket Stewarts, Carroll Tucker, the Duponts, and the Klebergs of King Ranch in Texas. His canvases are also in many homes in North and South Carolina and in private collections and galleries throughout the country.

Even when almost incapacitated with arthritis, Mr. Lundean continued his work. Aside from his art, he was esteemed and beloved in the Blowing Rock summer colony and lent his influence and efforts to the advancement of the famous resort.

He was an illustrator, a writer and an inspired teacher and lecturer. He was a member of the Adventurers Club of New York. His studios were in the Hotel des Artistes, One West 67th Street in New York and at "Westglow" in Blowing Rock.

His family originated in Scotland and Sweden. His great-grandfather was Arch Bishop Valline, who wrote the famous hymn to General Washington. His forebears established the famous University of Lund in Sweden.

Among Lundean's works are portraits of Man-of-War, Sysonby Dancer and Colin. He also painted Will Rogers from life on his famous cutting horse at King Ranch in Texas.

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lina Department. Following his discharge from the Army, McKee served a term on the Charlotte City Council and at age 25 was the youngest person ever to be elected to that office.

He is a former National Service Officer of the Disabled American Veterans, a member of Hornet's Nest Post 9 of The American Legion in Charlotte and of Voiture 620 of the Forty and Eight in Raleigh.

McKee was the first World War II veteran elected National President of The American Legion Press Association (1953-54). He is Editor of the North Carolina American Legion News.

Active in his church, White Memorial Presbyterian in Raleigh, and community service he has worked in fund-raising campaigns of the United Fund, Red Cross, March of Dimes, and Peace College.

He has held the office of American Legion Department Adjutant since March 1, 1949, and in that capacity operates the State headquarters of North Carolina's largest veterans organization. In addition to his duties as Department Adjutant and Finance Officer, McKee serves as manager of the \$200,000.00 Department Headquarters Building in Raleigh.
