
back on him.

There was an aged negro, loved by our family, who perished in a fire a few years ago. . . . Abe had an unselfishness about him and a love for children which endeared him to those of us who walked closely with him as he mowed the lawn and tended the garden and sat on a log with us sometimes to discuss human beings and their weaknesses and their strengths. . . . After his charred body was raked from the embers of his home, Jim Rivers wrote a column extolling the virtues of a generous soul, in which he expressed the fond hope that when Abe plodded along the golden streets in the celestial city, that the avenue would be flanked by hordes of little boys and girls, to whom he could pass out nickels from a bottomless sack of shining coins, and smile forever in the radiance of their dimpled laughter.

And we hope Fred Kirby is around for 300 years to gladden the Susies and the Anns and the Cindys and the Butches and the Chucks and the Bills, and that there may be an eternity filled with Calico horses and with boys and girls clapping their chubby hands and bringing perpetual happiness to one whose generous heart was big enough to hold an encompassing love for every single one of them.

Miss North Carolina, radiantly beautiful, tells us she loves the hills, and that she couldn't even see the rain for the infectious happiness and generosity of the people who came out to welcome her. . . .
