Girl Scout Board Has Annual Meeting

Meeting at the council office, the Catawba Valley Girl Scout Council Board of Directors began the new year with a heavy schedule of business regarding program and operations of the council. Approval of a twenty-five year lease for a building from the city of Hickory was the first item on the agenda. The building has approximately 4500 square feet of space and will contain permanent office space and storing areas for the administration of the Girl Scout program for the eight-county area served by the council. Mr. Philippe Giffissen, architect, was employed to draw plans for renovations to the building with work to begin immediately. It is expected that the building will be ready for occupancy in a few months.

Mrs. E. P. Bounous, council president, announced the employment of Mrs. Howard Graham who has joined the clerical staff in the council office. Mrs. Graham, a former volunteer worker in the Girl Scout program, has been a troop leader, Neighborhood Chairman and Board member and is experienced in many phases of the Girl Scout program and operation of the council.

A retirement plan for employed staff was approved by the Board to be incorporated into the council plan for 1963. A participating plan of the National Health and Welfare Retirement Association, approved by the Girl Scouts of the USA, it is scheduled to become effective July 1, 1963.

The 1963 Cookie Sale plan was reviewed and the immediate camping needs were discussed by members of the camp committee. The profits from the Cookie Sale are the council's only means for financing capital improvements and extending camping facilities to more girls. The camp committee is suggesting that each girl sell at least two cartons of cookies this year to help defray the costs of preparing the established camp site for use this summer. The sale will begin on February 29.

Mr. Byron Logan, Finance Committee chairman, presented the 1962 audit prepared by Hoffman and Rink, which was accepted by the board. Mr. Logan also announced an Institute for Long-Range Financing to be held in Greensboro in February which will be attended by Mrs. Bounous, council president.

A revised cycle of Board, Committee and Neighborhood meetings was discussed with emphasis on providing better services to troops, channeling information to leaders and more efficient coordination of materials for Neighborhood Service Teams. The new handbook for leaders, to be used as the program level changes begin in the fall, were discussed by Miss Martin, executive director, as including helpful information for all leaders, Brownie through Senior, so that the Girl Scout program will be emphasized as one continuous program for girls 7 through 17.

The board approved the nomination of Mrs. Kenneth Keever as Neighborhood Chairman for Shelby, whose job will be to coordinate and administer the Girl Scout program in her neighborhood as directed by the board.

The next meeting of the group is scheduled for February 18.

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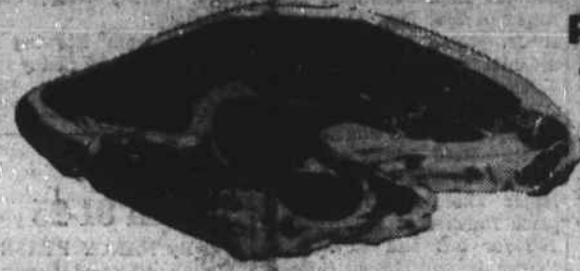

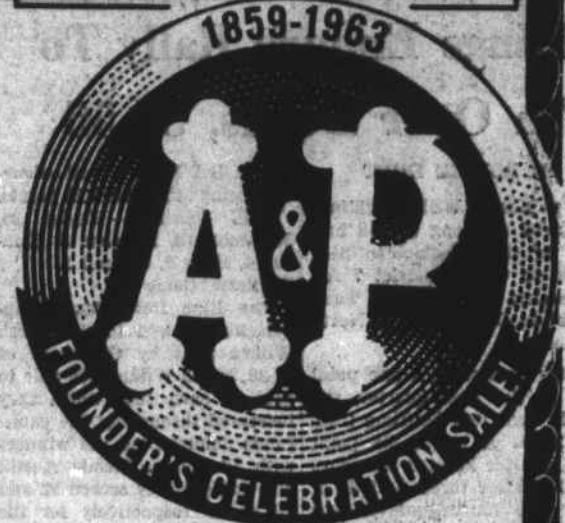
