Duncan Paces Apps In 77-72 Win Over LR

The Appalachian State Teachers College Mountaineers defeated the Lenoir Rhyne Bears on Saturday night in Hickory by the score of 77-72. This victory avenged an earlier loss to the Bears by 19 points in Boone in the earlier part of the season. This victory makes Appalachian's overall record 11-8, and gives them a conference mark of 8-5. The Mountaineers led throughout the entire contest, and led by as much as 20 points during some parts of the second half.

In the second half the Bears of Lenoir Rhyne began to press the Mountaineers and cut the lead to 4 points with 6 minutes to play in the game. The Mountaineers then held on to the lead and posted the final 5 point margin at 77-72.

Leading the way for the Mountaineers was Wayne Duncan with 20 points, Jim Richardson with 16, Doug Wall with 15, and Jack Lytton with 11 points.

Leading scorer for the Bears was Jim Wiles with 19 points, followed by Ed Miastowski, Jerry Wells, and Tommy Burton, all with 14 points.

Scholarships At State College

The Garden Club of North Carolina, Incorporated, has for several years awarded three scholarships in the School of Landscape Architecture at North Carolina State College. At the 1962 meeting of the Board of Directors of the Garden Club, these scholarships were increased to five and the amount of each was increased from \$500 to \$750 per year.

These are open to high school graduates who are interested in this field, and for a full four year college course, the candidate would realize \$3000.
