## Social Security Is Help To Dead Farmer's Family

widow and one teen-age daughter. This man had sufficient insurance to bury him, but little to be reported.

They had farmed rented land and lived in a rented house. The survivors will have to be assist ed by other relatives for a while. But there will be some assured income to the family in the form of Social Security payments. The farmer had filed tax returns starting with 1956 when sharecroppers were first covered by the Social Security law. He worked several acres and sold his crops for good money. But, after expenses, sometimes he had a loss, or nearly so.

In the low income years, however, he elected to pay Social Security tax on a part of his total income. For example, the deceased received, in an average year, \$2,000.00 for his crops. After expenses he would clear about \$700,00.

Because, his gross receipts were over \$1800.00 he could pay Social Security tax on \$1200.00. Three of his five years on rec ord were for this amount.

In figuring the survivor's benefits it was found that the mother and child are entitled to \$129.00 a month until the child is 18 years old. The mother will also receive a small lump-sum payment. This is not a lot of money, but it is assured.

It all came about because the farmer filed timely tax returns based on his earnings.


