tinues to have a major portion of the spotlight as the North Carolina Legislature enters the third month of the 1963 ses-Several new bills have been introduced, the latest of which would add Wilkes Coun-ty to our present Senatorial District. Another recent propos-al would reduce the member-ship in the House of Represen-tatives to 100 with one repretatives to 100, with one representative from each county, and increase the membership in the bill calling for a state-wide re-Senate to 80. This, of course, would require a Constitutional Amendment. This proposal would add Avery, Mitchell, Yancey and Madison Counties to our district and have two senators from the new district. Veteran observers indicate that the problem of Senatorial Redistricting may be a road block which will keep the Legisla-ture from adjourning by June
