The host club had a big surprise for Guy when he got in off of eighteen. In honor of the first "ace" on the new course, he was presented with a full set of golf clubs including a new bag and also one year membership. This came at a good time since Guy's membership ran out on the same day that he made the "ace". He was excited enough for making his first hole in one, but the little party that they gave him when his round was over made him even more so. His total score for the day, a very respectable 86, and as Guy said, "It's all there because Bert kept score and he counts them all."

Another member of the Hunt family pulled off an Eagle on the Tri-County Course last week, Ronnie made an eagle on the tenth hole the hard way. After a good tee shot on this par five hole, Ronnie hit his second over the green then chipped back into the hole for the three. He ended up with a score of 79, "not bad for a young lad who hasn't played much since last fall."

The Carolinas PGA now has two young professionals making a name for themselves on the professional tour. First it was Raymond Floyd of Fayetteville winning one of the Florida tournaments, his very first money won since he joined the tour in December and now Larry Beck has played outstanding golf in the Azalea Open at Wilmington and finished in a tie for second place. He was close to the leader Jerry Barber all the way, being within one shot at times and at the end of the first nine on the final round drew even. But at that point, Barber put on an Arnold Palmer finish and pulled out in front by several shots. Larry will be playing in the Greensboro Open next week on what could be called his "home course" since he worked as assistant to Tom Case there for almost a year, so he will bear watching in this one.

M. L. Walters, head of the physical education department at Appalachian State Teachers College, made public today the selection of the men and women's volleyball team members to represent the United States in the Pan American Olympics at Sao Paulo, Brazil, April 20 to May 5.

Walters is a member of the All-American selection committee and editor of the U. S. Volleyball Association's Guide and Rule Book.

Members of the men's team will be: Mike O'Hara, Walter Schiller, Barry Brown, Michael Bright, James Kaufman, and Peter Goldberg of the Hollywood YMCA; Peter Velasco and Tom Haine of the Honolulu YMCA; Charles Nelson, Kent Dorwin, William Van der Meer and Randal Carter of the Stockton YMCA.

Alternates will be: Harlan Cohen of the West Side Los Angeles Community Center, Milton Friedman of the Hollywood YMCA, and Robert Weisman of the Armed Services All-Star Team.

Coach for the men's team is Harry Wilson of the Hollywood YMCA, and the team manager is Prof. E. G. DeGroot of Santa Monica City College.

Members of the women's team will be: Jane Ward, Jayne Herwig, Jean Gaertner, Jane Russell, Johnette Latreille, Pat Lucas, Linda Murphy and Nancy Owen of the Los Angeles Ahern Shamrock team; Lou Sara Clark of the Dallas, Texas, YWCA; Beverly Miller and Mary Perry of the Los Angeles Spartans; and Jeanette Hobbs of the Gulf Coast.

Alternates are Joe Roe Jukerman of the Los Angeles Shamrocks and Pearl Boazman of the Gulf Coast.

Coach for the women's team is Gene Selznick of the Pasadena YMCA, and the manager is Dorothy Boyce of the Chicago Park Commission.

The men's team must finish first or second to qualify for the World Olympics in Tokyo in 1964, and the women's team must finish first at Sao Paulo to qualify.
