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Doctor Talk

Millions of Americans are disabled at this time by body defects, and daily and yearly the number is increasing. In this age of the "miracle drugs" such a situation seems incredible, but body impairments continue to develop.

Leading the list of impairments, is that of poor hearing, or deafness followed by defects of the limbs, back and trunk, and the lower extremities. Next in order of frequency are blindness and other visual impairments. Recent studies show that women, in general, are more subject to eye defects than men. This study further reveals that approximately seventy-seven million persons wear eye-glasses in this country, the figure not including six and a half million persons wearing contact lenses.

Thousands of young children will enter grade school for the first time in the fall so physical checkups will be in order; special attention should be paid to the examination of the preschool child's eyes. It is estimated that approximately one child in every twenty has a major eye defect.

Chief among the eye defects in pre-school children is refractive errors, accounting for about 70 per cent of all causes. Another leading cause is found to be motor anomalies, that is eye muscle imbalance. The detection and early treatment of eye defects in children provides physiological advantages, and, in addition, the acceptance of treatment at this young age is often dramatic.

The number of children being born blind or losing their vision by school age has rapidly decreased in the past ten to fifteen years. Credit must be given to the "miracle drugs" for one of the leading causes in the past was ophthalmia neonatorum, caused by gonorrheal infection. Such infection has now been virtually eradicated because of the widespread use of antibiotics.

Parents should be watchful for any of the common danger signals which may mean visual disturbances of a serious nature—such as persistent redness of the eyes; crossing of the eyes; distorted shape of unequal pupil size; persistent discharge, crusting, or tearing; and persistent discomfort or pain, especially after an eye injury.
