

Chas. Horton Dies In Wilkes

North Wilkesboro — Charles Gentry Horton, 78, of 611 F Street, North Wilkesboro, died at seven p. m. Wednesday in Wilkes General Hospital. He had been in declining health several months and was seriously ill ten days.

Mr. Horton spent most of his youth in Boone, where the family resided for a great many years.

He was born in Ashe County August 12, 1884, son of Nathaniel and DeEtta Councilll Horton. For several years he was a member of the police force in North Wilkesboro, retiring in 1938. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in North Wilkesboro.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Minnie Haire Horton of the home; son, Dwight Horton of Rutherfordton; daughter, Mrs. Don Melville of North Wilkesboro; four grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Mattie Hallman of Winston-Salem.

Funeral service was conducted at two p. m. Friday at the First Baptist Church in North Wilkesboro by the Rev. R. F. Smith Jr., pastor. Burial was in Mountlawn Memorial Park.

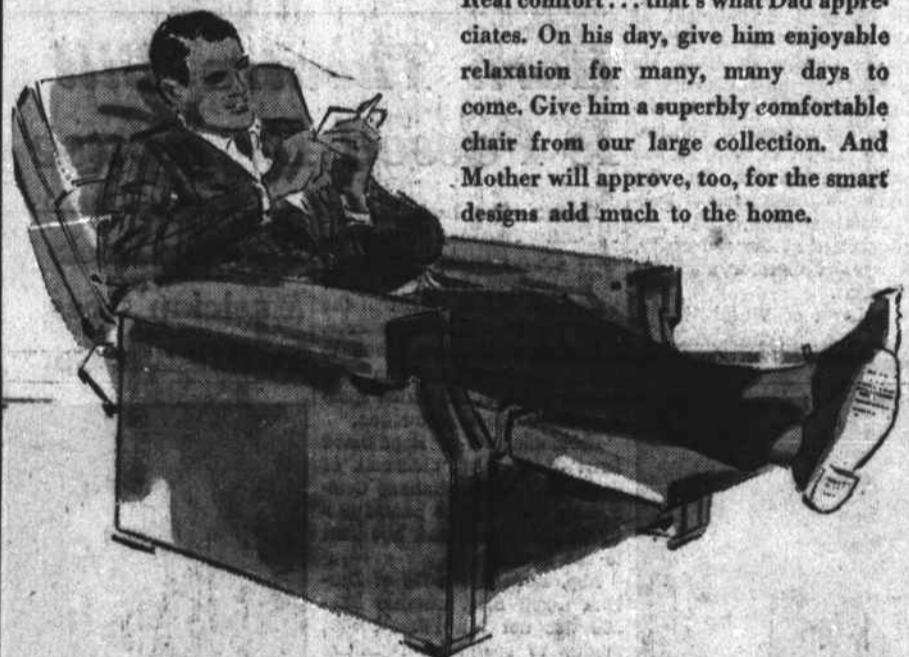


Summa Cum Laude

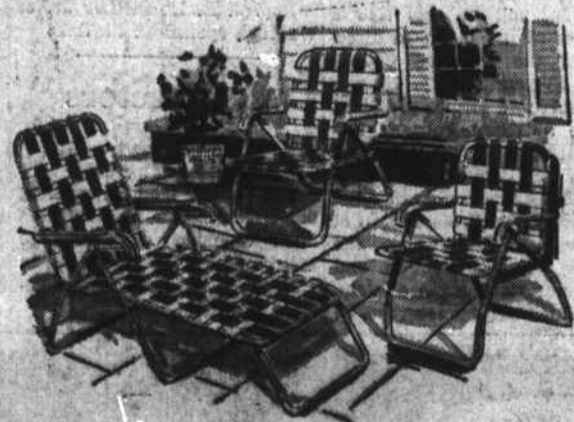
