Bloodmobile Coming To East Hall July 9

By JERRY ADAMS Chairman, Watauga County A. R. C. Blood Program Just suppose that you find yourself, or some member of your family in the hospital for an emergency operation unexpectedly. Just like a friend of mine did in the last month here in Watauga County. This person was visiting home folks and became real sick, was taken to the Watauga Hospital, and received, while there twelve pints of Red Cross blood for an emergency operation. This same thing can happen to you. You might get in on the receiving end of the Red Cross Blood Program any moment, and the benefits you receive are remarkable.

The handling of this is somewhat like your own dealings with your milkman. Hospitals place your blood orders with the Piedmont Red Cross Blood Center, and your blood is delivered in a sort of a milkman run each morning. The hospital places a minimum charge for the mechanics of the transfusion, but the blood itself is free, and this represents quite a savings.

Our next visit of the Bloodmobile is scheduled for July 9th, at East Hall on the ASTC

campus, and if you give a pint of blood this entitles you to the same benefits that a lot of other people in this county have received, such as a free physical examination, a blood donor pin, a blood type card, and this card is somewhat like a credit card, it entitles you, and any member of your family to all the blood that you need for six months for free. It's quite a bargain. Of if you should neglect to do this, you still can get Red Cross Blood free in an emergency, but, of course you must get a donor to replace this blood for you. It does appear that most anyone can benefit from our services. Meanwhile, why don't you go down and donate a pint of blood at the next visit of our Bloodmobile and reap the benefits that hundreds of others are doing here in Watauga County at this time? Let us remember that in blood donation, "it is more dramatic to receive than to give."
