Smith Retires After 40 Years In Classroom

Dr. Wiley Smith of Appalachian State Teachers College retires after more than 40 years in college and high school teaching.

During the last 27 years Dr. Smith has been professor of psychology at Appalachian and also chairman of the department.

Prior to Appalachian Dr. Smith taught at the Asheville Normal and Teachers College and at the University of South Carolina. At Peabody College he had a full-time teaching fellowship for one year and one

summer. He also did some teaching at Fisk University.

His first experience in college teaching was at Mayfield Junior College in 1929. Prior to that time he taught eight years in high school, including five years as principal.

The college professor is a charter member of the North Carolina Psychological Association and also a charter member of the Southeastern Psychological Association. He has been a member of the American Psychological Association for more

than 30 years.

He has formerly held membership in the North Carolina Academy of Science, the South Carolina Academy of Science and Tennessee Academy of Science. He was also a member of the American Association of University Professors, the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Southern Association for Psychology and Philosophy. He was a member of the Ninth International Congress of Psychology. He has read research papers at several of these professional organizations.

Dr. Smith is listed in Who's Who in North Carolina, Who's Who in American Education, Leaders in Education and the Psychological Registrar. He has published articles in three of the leading psychological journals and a short article in the Bulletin of Faculty Research of the University of South Carolina.

During his retirement years Dr. Smith will spend part of his time at 807 Northwood Drive, Huntingdon, Tenn., but most of the time he says will be spent at 910 Faculty St., Boone, where he has lived for several years.

Investigating patrolman W. D. Teem reported that the accident occurred at 2:45 p. m. The girls, all students at Appalachian College, were traveling to their homes in the piedmont section of the state.

Driver of the car, Miss Charlotte Marie Taylor, 21, of Cary, passed another vehicle on the narrow highway and lost control of the car as she attempted to pull back into the right-hand lane of traffic. The second car was not involved in the accident.

Injured were Mrs. Shirley Ragan Rogers, 26, of Raleigh, back injuries; Misses Carol Jones, 19, of Norlina, a fractured ankle; Mary Ann Ainsley, 19, of Ahsokie; Marian Rose Cherry, 31, of Durham; and Miss Taylor.

Jacksonville, Florida, escaped the wreck uninjured.

Sgt. Teem stated that the scene of the accident was near Myers Parkway Court. No charges were filed, he said.
