NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a Special Election to be held in the County of Watauga, North Carolina, on September 17, 1963, there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said County the question whether they shall approve or disapprove (1) the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of bonds of said County of the maximum principal amount of \$1,630,000, and (2) the levy of a tax for the payment of such bonds, and (3) the bond order entitled "Bond Order authorizing the issuance of \$1,630,000 School Bonds of the County of Watauga," adopted by the Board of Commissioners on August 13, 1963, to authorize the issuance of said bonds and the levy of such tax, and the question whether they shall approve or disapprove the levy of a special tax of not exceeding 10 cents, annually, upon each \$100 of assessed valuation of taxable property in said County to finance the cost of operating, equipping and maintaining public hospital facilities for the use of the inhabitants of said County. The \$1,630,000 bonds are authorized to finance the cost of constructing in the Watauga County School Administrative Unit several new buildings to be used as school houses, school garages, physical education and vocational education buildings, teacherages, and lunchrooms and other school plant facilities and to reconstruct and to enlarge, by the erection of additions, several existing buildings located in such unit and used for such purposes, in order to enable the County of Watauga, as an administrative agency of the public school system of the State of North Carolina, to maintain public schools in said School Administrative Unit for the nine months' school term as prescribed by law. The \$500,000 bonds are authorized to finance the cost of erecting and equipping a new building or buildings for use as public hospital facilities, and to acquire a site therefor. In the event that a majority of the qualified voters at said election shall vote to approve the incurring of such indebtedness and the levy of such taxes, said bonds shall be issued and taxes shall be levied for the payment of such bonds and said special tax levied.

The polls for the election will open at the hour of 6:30 o'clock a.m. and will close at the hour of 6:30 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time. The election will be held at the same polling place at which the last general election was held in Watauga County for the election of members of the General Assembly.

The registration books shall be opened for the registration of voters at 9:00 o'clock a.m. on Saturday, August 24, 1963, and shall be closed at sunset on Saturday, September 7, 1963. On each day (Sundays excepted) during such period, the Registrar for each election precinct in the County will keep his book open between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a.m. and sunset for the registration of voters in such election precinct. On each Saturday during such period each Registrar will attend at the polling place in his election precinct between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a.m. and sunset for the registration of voters.

Stoneman Left Some Relics

J. Wayne Harmon of Valle Crucis has some Civil War relics which date back to Stoneman's raid through Watauga county, and tells the following story about them: General Stoneman left Butler, March 24, 1865. That night he camped near Beech Creek, the next night at Sugar Grove, entering the town of Boone the following day.

John Eli Harmon, age 16, was hiding in the woods near the Hollow Rock about a half mile west of Laurel Creek, when he saw a wagon broken down. The soldiers stayed there some time. After they left he took his mother's old mare he had hidden in the woods and hauled an ammunition carrier, a cannon ball, cartridges, wads and a Captain's whistle to his home, where they remained until his death in 1923. Then the relics became the property of his youngest son, Mr. J. Wayne Harmon, who still owns them.

Saturday Classes Offered At ASTC For Fall Quarter

Twenty-six Saturday classes will be offered at Appalachian State Teachers College during the fall quarter, according to an announcement today by Dr. James Stone, director of extension.

Classes will be offered in Diagnostic and Remedial Reading, A-V Instruction, Principles of Guidance, Social Foundations of Education, Research in Education, Org. and Adm. of Secondary Schools, Curriculum Construction, Extra-Curricular Activities, Investigations in Reading, Org. and Sup. of Student Teaching and Org. and Adm. of Guidance Services.

Also there will be classes in Philosophy of Education, Psychology of the Mentally Retarded, Biology in the High School, Survey of Business Finance, Modern Chemistry for High School Teachers, American Literature to 1830, Literature for Children, Reading Interests and Guidance, Secondary School Mathematics or Abstract Algebra, Music Activities in Elementary School, Seminar in Health and Physical Education and N. C. History to 1835.

By attending Saturday classes during any one quarter, the graduate student may earn six weeks of residence. If he chooses, he may take three hours one quarter and three another for six weeks of residence.

As much as 18 hours of credit Books and supplies cost approximately \$15. Registration for classes will be held in the Administration Building between class meetings on September 14. Students will meet the class of their choice at 8 a. m. and will be dismissed at 10 a. m. for registration. At 12:30 the class scheduled at 11:40 will meet. For the other nine Saturdays classes meeting at 8:30 will end at 11:10 and classes meeting at 11:40 will end at 2:30.

Classes will meet September 14, 21, 28, October 5, 12, 19, 26, November 2, 9, and 17. Students are to prepare for the first meeting of their classes. Assignments may be obtained by writing to Dr. Cratis Wilcove in Saturday classes may be applied toward the Master's degree. Dr. Williams Explains Folk Music Jag Sweeping Country

What accounts for this current folk music jag among sophisticated Americans that is sweeping the country? Dr. Cratis Williams, outstanding ballad singer and authority on folk music of the Southern Appalachian region, demonstrated his folk music speciality during Folk Music Night at "Horn In The West" on August 10 prior to the presentation of the outdoor drama, Dr. Williams is director of graduate studies at Appalachian State Teachers College and has taught ballad singing for a number of years.

Explaining the current trends, Dr. Williams said, "Traditional ballads and folksongs are now enjoying a popularity among young people which is unparalleled in the history of the revival of interest in ballads. 'Young people are searching for permanent and satisfying values which they are unable to find by identifying themselves with causes and religious protest—intellectual movements, social causes which consumed the youthful energies of their elders.'"

He added that Sputnik, existentialism political hypocrisies, smugness and eminent respectability, and social confusion in their generation have bewildered young people, who, above all things, want simplicity, honesty, and integrity not only in the lives of others but in their own lives as well.

The college professor believes that youngsters are looking for honesty in art, too. In the unpretentious ballads and songs projected from the lives of humble people of the past the youth of today finds something with which he can identify.

The story ballads tell tales motivated by conflicts of clean and clear decisions. The prose and images of these stories belonging to another age suggest stability and order.

Dr. Williams declared that a stable and orderly world in which human passions and conflicts are pure and cleanly identifiable, men are honestly what they are, heroes or villains, and art is unpretentious in addressing itself directly to the human heart exists in the better ballads and folksongs. Young people want to identify with this world. Until our times settle into order and promise something permanent, ballads and folksongs will ride high waves of popularity.

Mexican Diplomat Is Convocation Speaker

The majority of books written on Mexico have been done by Americans who spent a week in Mexico gathering information to become an authority on the subject.

These were the words of Senor Thesewerthwof Senor E. sof Eugenio de Anzorena, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of Mexico, as he presented a "Mexican Point of View" to the student body and faculty of Appalachian State Teachers College during the recent convocation services on the college campus.

In the Mexican diplomatic service for 35 years, Senor Anzorena has been lecturing in Spanish on certain phases of Mexican life to the participants in the NDEA Language Institute at Appalachian.

Dr. Roy Prince, head of the department of foreign languages at ASTC, introduced the speaker. Dr. D. J. Whitener, dean of the college, presided over the convocation services and introduced the administrative staff of the summer sessions. Dr. W. H. Plimmons, president of Appalachian, brought greetings and a word of welcome recognized visiting professors to new and old students and who are on the summer sessions faculty. Dr. John Barden, professor of education at ASTCC, gave the invocation. Special music was under the direction of Charles Isley, ASTC associate professor of music.
