NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Special Election to be held in the County of Watauga, North Carolina, on September 17, 1963, there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said County the question whether they shall approve or disapprove (1) the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of bonds of said County of the maximum principal amount of \$1,630,000, and (2) the levy of a tax for the payment of such bonds, and (3) the bond order entitled "Bond Order authorizing the issuance of \$1,630,000 School Bonds of the County of Watauga," adopted by the Board of Commissioners on August 13, 1963, to authorize the issuance of said bonds and the levy of such tax, and the question whether they shall approve or disapprove (1) the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of bonds of said County of the maximum principal amount of \$500,000, and (2) the levy of a tax for the payment of such bonds, and (3) the bond order entitled "Bond Order authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 Public Hospital Bonds of the County of Watauga," adopted by the Board of Commissioners on August 13, 1963, to authorize the issuance of said bonds and the levy of such tax, and the question whether they shall approve or disapprove the levy of a special tax of not exceeding 10 cents, annually, upon each \$100 of assessed valuation of taxable property in said County to finance the cost of operating, equipping and maintaining public hospital facilities for the use of the inhabitants of said County. Outdoor Living-Room Is Important

Flowering plants can be grown in large pots and moved into the outdoor living room to furnish warmth and color. The background planting should be evergreen.

In some sections of the country, mainly California, and Texas, heating systems are installed to extend the life of the outdoor living room. Enclosed on at least three sides hot water heating pipes are placed in the ground coverings. It is possible to use an outdoor living room some of the time almost every month of the year in many sections of the U. S. A.

The outdoor living room is the perfect place to entertain. It never becomes as noisy or cigarette smoke-filled as the same floor space inside a home. The relaxed informal air it gives to a party is in keeping with our modern way of life.

Know The Weather

Is the hurricane season over? Why do these storms strike only in the east?

No the hurricane season is not over. These storms may begin as early as August and often occur in October and even into November. By December they are usually a thing of the past.

Hurricanes strike the eastern United States and occasionally the middle states via the Gulf, because they spawn over water. Their course is either north or northeast, though they sometimes move northwest out of the Gulf.

They seldom if ever strike the west coast of the United States and should they do so, the Rocky Mountains protect the western states, acting as a barrier which breaks up such storms as they move westward. Thus, the western states are free from these tropical-bred maritime cyclones.

Garden Time

By M. E. GARDNER I have just read in a national magazine under the caption "Plant These More Often" an article about Dutchman's Breeches—Dianthus cucularia.

Searching back into my memory I seemed to associate the plant, Dutchman's Breeches, with an outbreak of "blind staggers" among livestock in southwest Virginia. This was a good number of years ago.

Having aroused my curiosity, I consulted Dr. Hardin's bulletin, "Poisonous Plants of North Carolina," and confirmed my suspicion. I also checked with a member of the staff in Veterinary Science.

Dutchman's Breeches contains several alkaloids which poison cattle when eaten. This plant is found in the deep woods and cliffs in most of our mountain counties and, locally, in a small area of the Piedmont.

It does make a good garden plant, however, if placed in a shaded spot between rocks and in good soil. The name comes from the small divided blossoms which resemble a pair of miniature Dutchman's breeches. The plant flowers from April through May producing four to eight cream or creamy-pink blossoms on slender stems 6 to 12 inches high.

While we are on the subject of poisons, I have warned you so many times about the proper use of insecticides that I have almost promised myself not to raise the subject again. However, disturbing news again comes, by way of the newspapers, of the death of a little two-year-old and the illness of many others in the same county, caused by parathion poisoning. This will probably not happen again in this community but the sacrifice of the little one is too high a price to pay for adult ignorance and carelessness.

We inspect privies, septic tanks, barbage cans, slaughter houses and kitchens. Are garbage cans and cockroaches more important than human lives? Why not include the tobacco barn, the machinery shed or wherever pesticides are stored in our inspections? Require safe storage and use of pesticides by legislation, if necessary, because we will be using these materials as long as we produce food and fiber.
