Adams is leading the way with rounds of 69-72-141, one under par for the thirty-six holes. He is followed by brother, Austin, with 71-73-144 and Ernest Hayes with 75-74-149. About the only person left with a chance to take medal honors from Sam is defending champion John Broyhill who is expected to qualify this week.

There is still time for players to qualify who would like to play in this event. Qualifying ends this coming Sunday night with first round matches getting under way Monday with seven days to play each match.

Leading the qualifiers in the ladies division with 93-99-182 is Gertrude Perry followed by Dolly Matheson at 203. However, Julie Barber should take medal honors in this division since she has posted a first round score of 83. We need a couple more ladies to make two flights of eight so any of you that would like to play, start your qualifying right away. Time is running short.

Mountaineers Drop Season's Opener To Wofford, 21-14

A last minute touchdown by the Wofford Terriers climaxed an uphill battle and spelled defeat for the Appalachian State Teachers College Mountaineers 21-14, in the season's opener for both teams Saturday night.

Appalachian led by 14-6 going into the fourth quarter and appeared to have the game under control, but a pair of long passes from quarterback Todd Heldreth to flanker Benjie Brannon changed the tide.

Wofford scored first, in the opening minutes of the game. The 37-yard scoring drive was climaxed when Heldreth hit end Joe Smith with a 16-yard pass to the Appalachian four; Heldreth then ran around end for the touchdown. The extra point attempt failed.

Appalachian took the ensuing kickoff and marched 63 yards in six plays to paydirt. With Nikki Helms and Tom Culbreth leading the way on the ground, quarterback Dennis Saunders set up the touchdown with a 34-yard pass to end Larry Harbin. Culbreth scored off tackle from the 15, and the extra point made the halftime score 7-6.

The Mountaineers took the second-half opening kickoff and drove 60 yards for a score, on a one-yard run around end by Saunders. Saunders also added

the extra point for a 14-6 lead. Wofford's Terriers then took over, taking advantage of a missed field goal attempt by the Mountaineers to move 30 yards in just two plays for a score. Halfback Archie Black ran the two-pointer which moved the score to 14-14.

An Appalachian drive late in the fourth quarter ended with their third unsuccessful field goal attempt of the night from the Wofford 12. With 32 seconds remaining, Heldreth found Brannon behind the Appalachian defenders and hit the big flanker for a 51-yard touchdown pass. Bob Darnell added the point for the final score.

The game was a battle of offense against defense, with the Mountaineers being halted several times deep within Wofford territory.

The Mountaineers will host the Indians of Newberry Saturday night in William J. Conrad Stadium in a Carolinas Conference clash. The game is the only contest scheduled this week between conference teams. Newberry is a newcomer to the conference and this is the first meeting between the Indians and the Mountaineers which count in conference standings.

Appalachian is in the position of having to win all conference encounters in order to win the conference crown. All other schools except Guilford play six opponents while Appalachian and Guilford do not meet.

Devils Roll Over Ashe Central, 46-0

The Appalachian High School Blue Devils rolled over the Ashe Central Black Panthers Friday night, Sept. 13, by the score of 46-0. This was Appalachian's second win of the current season against no losses.

Ashe Central took the opening kickoff, but was stopped cold by the hard-charging defensive line of the Blue Devils. Ashe Central was forced to punt, and Wayne Clawson, a senior fullback, scored on a 31-yard jaunt on the Devil's first offensive play of the night. Phil Hampton carried over for the extra point. Later in the first period, Chuck Blanton, a senior wingback, on a 59-yard touchdown on a counter play. Johnny Parker, another hard-running senior back, barreled in for the extra point to give the local team a 14-0 advantage after one quarter of play.

Blanton opened the second period scoring with a 4-yard sprint around end. Senior end Ronnie Hunt gathered in a pass from Mike Wilson for the extra point. Phil Hampton set up the final score of the first half with a long punt return deep into Ashe Central territory. Allan Wagner took it over from four yards out, and sophomore Steve Hampton scored the extra point on a pass from Charles Stanley.

Wayne Clawson scored his second touchdown of the night on a 3-yard plunge over the left side of Appalachian's offensive line to open the second half scoring parade. Shortly thereafter, junior wingback Jack Roten ran forty yards around left end for a touchdown. The only other score in the game came in the final period when Gary Storie scampered 70 yards to paydirt.

The Blue Devils' overall offense looked good in piling up

374 yards rushing and 23 yards passing for a total offense of 397 yards. Also not to be overlooked was the Devils' defensive forward wall which kept the Panthers bottled up all evening or the defensive secondary which didn't allow Ashe Central to complete a pass. Appalachian's captains for the game were Bob Wilson and Alton Johnson, both seniors.

This week's game will take place on the Morganton High School field, Thursday night at 7:30. Appalachian's opponent will be the North Carolina School for the Deaf. NCSD has played two games and has won them both, so the Thursday night affair should be close and it will be full of action.

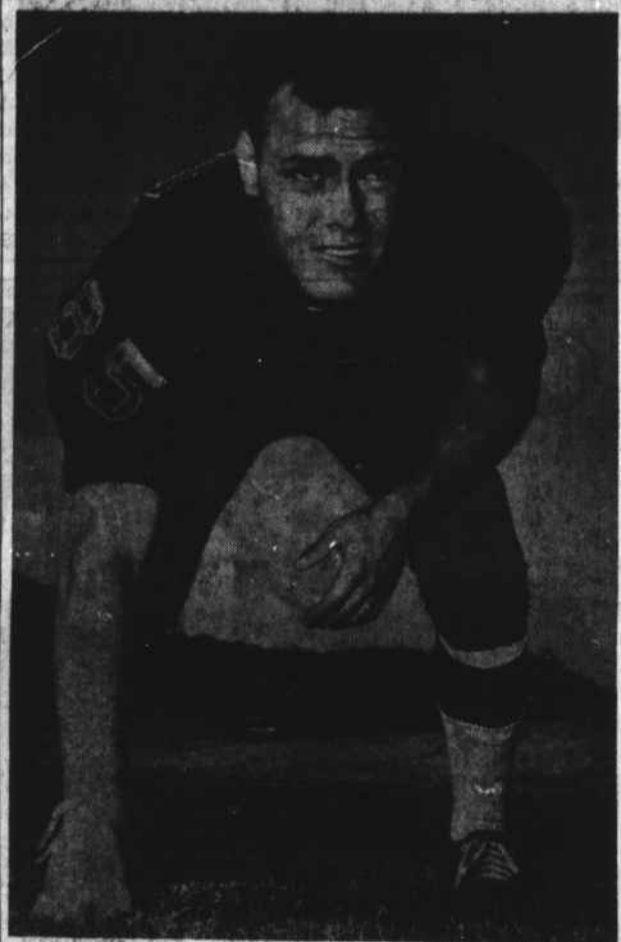
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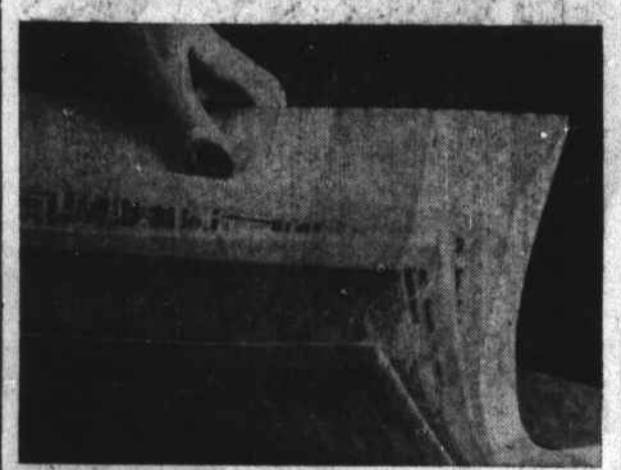
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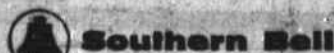
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
