#### German Chocolate Pie 1/2 pkg. German chocolate

1/2 stick butter

4 eggs, separated 1 small can evaporated milk

1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup sugar

Melt together the chocolate and butter. Beat the egg yolks; add sugar and milk, then vanilla. Beat well. Then add the chocolate mixture and beat well. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake at 350 for 35 to 40 minutes or until done.

For meringue, beat egg whites until stiff, adding two tablespoons sugar for each white. Put meringue on pie and bake until brown.

For variety, you may add onehalf cup chopped nuts and/or one-fourth cup coconut to the pie before baking.


