I got this salad recipe out of the Columbia Missourian. First serve a thin hot soup and top it off with some fruit and cookies for a very satisfying meal.

- Salmon Macaroni Salad
- 8 ounces elbow macaroni
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar
- 2 tablespoons salad oil
- 2 teaspoons grated onion or 2 tablespoons chopped chives
- 1 1-pound can salmon, drained and flaked
- 2 pounds fresh peas, shelled and cooked
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 pimento, minced
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill, or 1/2 teaspoon dry dill weed

Cook macaroni according to directions on package. Drain and rinse well in cold water. Toss lightly with lemon juice, salad oil, and grated onion or chives and pile into serving bowl. Make a well in center and fill with flaked salmon.

Surround the salmon with a ring of cooked peas. Garnish with wedge of lemon and chill until ready to serve.

Toss at table and serve with a salad dressing made by combining sour cream, salt, pepper, pimento, and dill.
