Fresh Apple Cake

CREAM:
3 eggs
1 1/4 cup Wesson oil
2 cups sugar.

ADD:
3 cups cake flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup broken pecan meats.
3 cups chopped raw apples.

MIX THOROUGHLY (very stiff mixture).
Pour into a greased and floured loaf or tube pan and bake in a 350 degree oven for 1 hour 15 minutes.

ICING:
1 stick margarine
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup evaporated milk
Cook about 2 1/2 minutes. Pour over the cake while both are hot. Black walnuts are a delicious substitute for pecan meats.
