Good Service Is Seen For **Expanded Area**

Town officials and water-sewer engineers from Asheboro probably will be digging out from under a huge pile of paper matter when they have opened sealed bids at the Town Hall on Tuesday, June 21.

Six bids are to be let for the construction of a new sewer in Boone: interceptor sewers, sewage collection and outfall lines north of interceptor; sewage collection and outfall lines south of interceptor; waste treatment facility; heating installation for water treatment facility; and electrical installation for waste treatment facility.

Bids are to be let in five sections for partial construction and expansion of the Town's water facilities: Lake storage reservoir and dam; water distribution system; tank foundations, access roadway and miscellaneous structures; town water storage tank; and electrical

Plans, specifications and proposed forms are on file at the office of Moore, Gardner & Associates, Inc., Asheboro, N. C., according to Mayor Brown. Proposals made to the engineers must clearly be marked as to which project and which division they apply.

The addition of a Federal grant from the Economic Development Administration the first of May boosted funds \$1, 003,500 to a total of \$3,103,500. Brown said in a news story May 5 that "It will be necessary to go on and complete the engineers' plans, let them out for bids and get all bids in before the money can be allott


