Spires' curiosity and mania for exactness got the better of him recently upon reading in the recently published Year Book of the News and Observer that the population of Edenton was 3,635. Mr. Spires wrote to both Thad Eure, Secretary of State, and to the News and Observer for verification of the figures. In the North Carolina Manual, published by the Secre-tary of State's office, the population

of Edenton was given as 3,835. Early this week Mr. Spires correct and was verified by the report from the 1940 Federal Census of the Department of Commerce. So now, Mr. Spires is satisfied that the population of Edenton has been restored to its actual figure.
