(Continued from Page One) the necessary production of glycerine for use in explosives.

The goal of each family is between one and two pounds of waste cooking fats per month, or 17 pounds per year, which should yield well over half a billion pounds per year. Any housewife who saves 17 pounds during the year has salvaged enough to make more than a pound and a half of glycerine. This amount of glycerine will provide sufficient power, when used in a propellent gun powder, to fire 85 anti-tank shells at our enemies. Seventeen pounds of waste kitchen fats will also produce nearly ten pounds of dynamite.
