

## Change Made Duck Hunting Regulations

### Not Necessary for Permit If Hunting Is Done on Land

Following recently announced regulations relative to duck shooting, C. E. Kramer this week received a letter explaining some changes.

It is still necessary, however, for all persons desiring to indulge in duck shooting to make application at the Elizabeth City Coast Guard office or at the office of the Captain of the Port at Morehead City. All persons desiring to go duck hunting must obtain a special permit for that purpose.

Those persons employing a boat must, in addition to a permit, possess a Coast Guard identification card which can also be obtained at the Elizabeth City Coast Guard office, providing they have no identification card. If a boat is used which is over 16 feet in length, in addition to a permit and a Coast Guard identification card, the boat must have a license, which also will be issued by the Coast Guard.

Those persons who intend to do land hunting will not be required to have a permit.

North Carolina duck hunters are included in Zones 7 and 8. Zone 7 extends from the North Carolina-Virginia line on the north to New Topsail Inlet on the south and extends six miles inland from the coast.

Zone 8 includes the area west of Zone 7, between the North Carolina-Virginia line and New Topsail Inlet. It is, therefore, suggested that those desiring to hunt ducks in these zones contact the office of Lieut. N. H. Church, Captain of the Port, Morehead City, or Captain of the Port, U. S. Coast Guard, Elizabeth City.

## Young Men Needed For Inshore Patrol

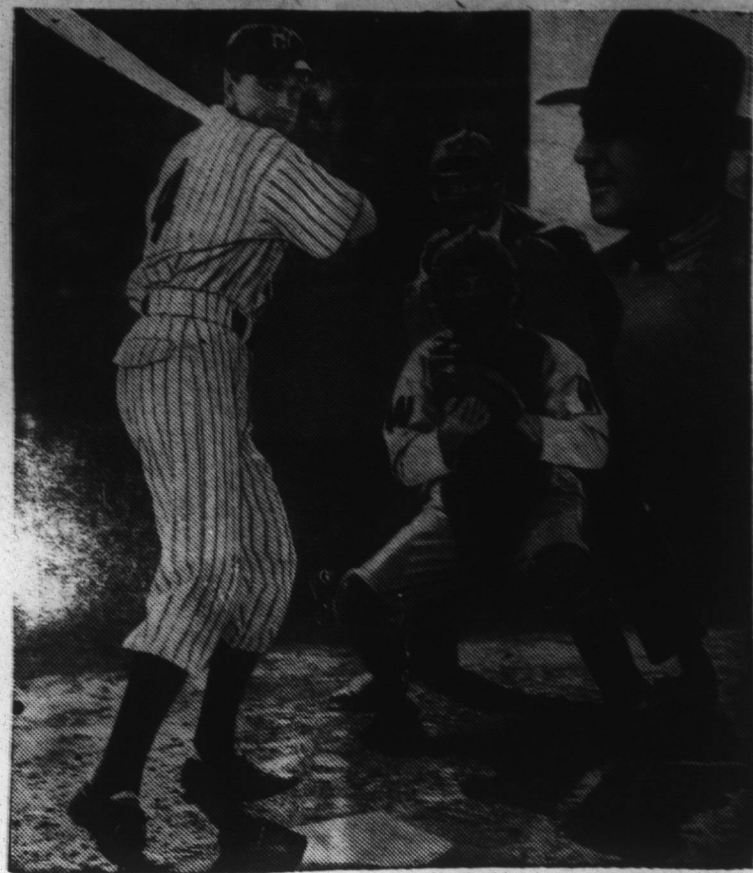
