#### Groups From Several Counties Expected To Attend

District No. 9 of the N. C. Congress of Parent-Teacher Association will hold a war conference at Hertford on Tuesday, October 20. Present for the meeting will be officers and members of the Parent-Teacher Associations in Bertie, Chowan, Camden, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Hertford, Martin, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell and Washington counties.

A study will be made at this meeting of war agencies with which the P. T. A. is cooperating as well as a discussion of school education and legislation.

Phillips, of Greensboro, who will lead a symposium; a question hour and discussion will be led by Mrs. E. N. Howell, of Swannanoa, field representative of the State organization.
