Commissioners **Concerned About** School Busses

Send Report of Grand Jury to Sergeant **George Dail**

After reading the report of the Grand Jury for the December Term of Superior Court, the County Commissioners on Monday took special notice of the following:

"The Edenton white busses were very dirty, the students playing in them during school hours and lunch periods. There are several cracked glasses in each bus. By interrogation we find most of this damage is done on the school grounds. Shortage of busses due to the war makes it very necessary that these busses be taken better care of. Chowan High (white) and Edenton colored busses are O. K.'






