\$4,000 Mark Reached In Millard F. Bond, Jr. **Chowan County's Drive To** eet Quota In War Fund

Chairman J. H. Conger's Report Only Partially Complete

THERMOMETER

Chairman Urges Early Completion of Work By Canvassers

With only a partial report of Chowan's United War Fund drive in the hands of General Chairman J. H. Conger, up to Wednesday morning contributions amounted to approximately \$4,000, or about \$2,000 short of the \$6,000 quota for the county.

According to a preliminary survey of the report the figures reveal that Edenton's portion of the quota is gradually being raised, while the amount allotted to the rural section of the county had been only about half raised. The total quota of \$6,000 has been broken down as follows: Edenton, \$3,250, the county \$1,000 and \$1,750 at the U.S. Marine Corps Air Station. A splendid response has been reported at the base, where George C. Cunney, Navy auditor, 18 in charge of collecting contributions, and who assures Chairman Conger that the base's quota will be reached and most likely over-subscribed.
