

## Police Make 65 Arrests in Month

### Town Councilmen Asked to Change Two Ordinances

Edenton police, made 65 arrests during November, according to the monthly report of Chief of Police J. R. Tanner. Of this number drunks led, there being 13 arrests for drunkenness. Seven arrests were made for larceny charges, six for violation of health laws, six for drunken driving, six for parking wrong, five for vagrancy, four for speeding, four for assault, four for participating in affrays, four for gambling, two for destroying public property, two for assault with a deadly weapon, and one each for

AWOL, disorderly conduct, indecent exposure and violation of the taxi laws.

During the month 24 lights were reported out, 31 calls answered, 33 complaints handled, five doors found open, five fire calls answered, 17 courtesies extended, and 23 investigations made. Twenty-nine cases were tried by magistrates, 19 in Recorder's Court and six in Superior Court. Of this number, 46 were found guilty and five not guilty.

The amount of fines imposed was \$1,247.50; costs, \$451.95, and \$85 was turned over to the town collector, making the total court revenue \$1,784.45.

In Chief Tanner's report, Town Councilmen were requested to either revise or abolish the town ordinance relating to pecan trees on town property, and to change the ordinance requiring motorists to display their town tags on the front to read that tags must be displayed on the rear of automobiles especially for the duration of the war.

## Growers May Sell Peanuts To Plant

### New Amendment Permits Buying Enough For Planting

Peanut growers may sell farmers' stock peanuts of the 1943 crop to other producers for planting, according to an announcement by E. M. Johnson, manager of the Growers Peanut Cooperative, Inc., who quoted an amendment to Commodity Credit Corporation Order No. 4 as his source of authority.

The amendment permits one producer to sell farmers' stock peanuts to another "for planting by or for him." The buyer can not, however, Johnson said, buy the peanuts for seed and then re-sell them for seed. While there is no stipulation as to the quantity of peanuts a grower may sell for this purpose and no fixed scale related to the quantity a producer may buy, Johnson said they are assured permission to buy enough to fill their needs.

## Bulk Of Peanut Crop Is Picked

### Work In Section Expected to Be Finished In Two Weeks

In the Virginia-North Carolina section the bulk of the Virginia and Spanish peanut crop has already moved and should be completed within the next ten days to two weeks if weather conditions remain favorable. However, small isolated lots still unpicked and not expected to move until after the first of the year. Offerings and sales on Virginias are light although demand is good. This is due to present heavy commitments for future delivery. Markets held steady and prices unchanged from a week ago at 15 1/4 cents for Virginia Jumbos; 15 cents for Fancys; 14 5-8 cents for Number Ones, and 13 1/2 to 13 3/4 cents for Number Twos.

## Charles L. Copeland Is Graduated From U. S. Bomber School

Private First Class Charles L. Copeland, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Copeland, graduated December 22, from the B-24 Liberator bomber mechanics school at Keesler Field, Biloxi, Miss., and is now ready for active line duty.

Pfc. Copeland, however, may be sent to a factory school for further specialized training or to one of the Army Air Forces Training Command's flexible gunnery schools to become an aerial gunner.

In the course of approximately 17 weeks at Keesler Field, he learned about airplane mechanics' tools, electric and hydraulic systems, instruments, propellers, fuel systems, engine operation and aircraft inspection. The last eight days were spent at "Fort Liberator," a branch of the school where he learned to perform maintenance work on aircraft under simulated battle conditions.
