"If orders are placed now and deliveries accepted as far in advance of the curing season as possible, it the drive now amounts to \$1,587.63. appears at the present time that sufficient supplies are available to meet the demands for tobacco curing, and the operation of hatcheries and brooders," Mr. Price said.

Since the Solid Fuels Administration is being discontinued, it is not anticipated at the present time that preference certificates, for the purchase of bituminous coal for these purposes, will be issued through the local AAA office, as last year.
