

OUT PATIENT MEDICAL CARE AND HOSPITALIZATION FOR WAR VETERANS

Important Information Released By Warren G. Knight

In order that certain misunderstandings concerning procedure to be followed by veterans, their beneficiaries, or representatives in obtaining out-patient medical care for veterans may be clarified, the following information has been released by Warren G. Knight, local Contact Representative of the Veterans Administration.

Out Patient Medical Care

1. In order to be eligible for treatment at Veterans Administration Hospitals, or civilian medical treatment at expense of the Veterans Administration, the veteran must meet the following conditions:

General Information

6. Non-emergent and elective surgical and medical procedures such as hemorrhoidectomies, tonsillectomies, resection of fistulas and allergy studies will not be authorized prior to the establishment of service connection.

7. The following general rules for medical treatment and hospitalization of the veteran at Veterans Administration expense apply, and are reviewed as follows:

a. The veteran may be cared for at VA hospital out patient departments for service connected disabilities.

b. The veteran may be cared for by a civilian physician for service connected disabilities.

c. The veteran may be hospitalized in VA hospitals for both service connected and non-service connected disabilities, the latter only if facilities are available.

d. The veteran may be hospitalized in civilian hospitals for emergent treatment of service connected disabilities only.

e. The female veteran may be hospitalized in civilian hospitals, on authorization by the Veterans Administration, for non-service connected disabilities, but not for pregnancy.

8. Commissioned officers of the armed forces on terminal leave are not entitled to medical care and hospitalization by the Veterans Administration.

9. The Veterans Administration Regional Office for North Carolina is located in the Nissen Building, Winston-Salem, and physicians should contact this office, collect, in any medical eventuality involving a veteran. The telephone number there at Winston-Salem is 3-5521.

Experiment Made In Curing Peanuts

A hay-drying shed on the Warner Evans farm is being used in an experiment for curing peanuts. Dr. Weaver of the N. C. State College Agricultural Engineering Department is supervising the work. The shed at the present time has approximately 20 acres of peanuts on the vine in cure. The forced air system appears to be drying out both the peanuts and the hay very satisfactorily.

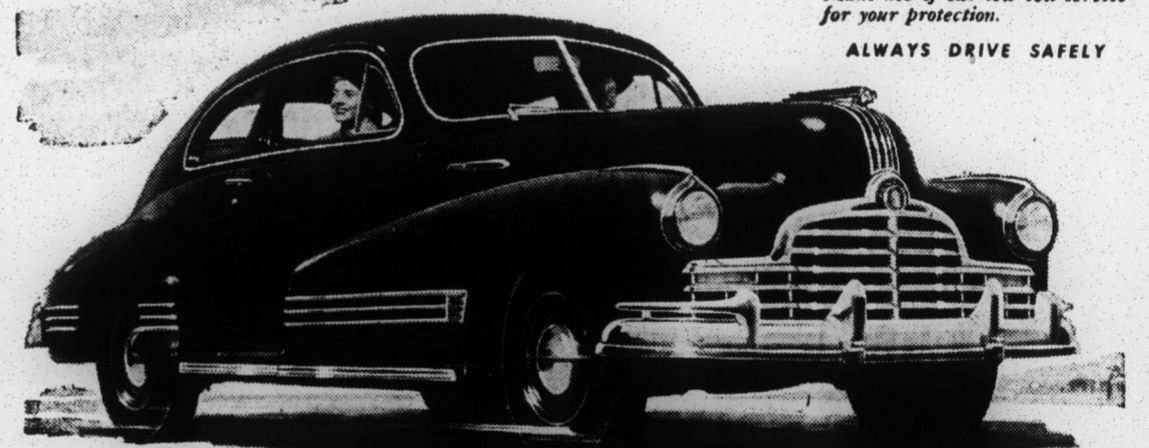
