

Mrs. Gladysteen Pait Resigns As County's Public Health Nurse

Left Saturday For Special T. B. Training at N. C. Sanatorium

Mrs. Gladysteen Pait, for five years senior public health nurse of the local Health Department, left Edenton Saturday after resigning her position. Mrs. Pait tendered her resignation two weeks before and has gone to Sanatorium, N. C., where she will take three weeks of special training in tuberculosis nursing in the N. C. Sanatorium before joining her husband, who has been attending college since his discharge from the Army.

Mrs. Pait, before leaving, said she regretted to leave Edenton and that she and her husband had hoped to make Edenton their future home, but that circumstances developed which changed their minds. While here Mrs. Pait made many friends, all of whom will learn with regret that she has gone.

No successor for Mrs. Pait had been announced up to Saturday.

Jail Sale Postponed

Though the jail at the Chowan County Home was scheduled to be sold to the person submitting the highest bid before Monday, the County Commissioners postponed the sale until their January meeting. Although at least two persons are known to be interested in buying the old jail, no bids were in the hands of the Commissioners about mid-way of their meeting, so that it was decided to hold over the sale until January.

One sealed bid was submitted before the Commissioners adjourned, and the other prospective purchaser stated that he would submit his bid. Anyone interested in buying the jail must send a sealed bid to Chairman West Byrum before the next regular meeting on January 6.

Prices For Cotton Up During Week

Cotton prices advanced during the week ending November 27. Cotton entering the Government loan, although small in volume, is increasing. Spot market activity decreased. The paralyzing effects of the coal strike on industry generally will retard cotton consumption substantially if the strike is long continued.

Prices for Middling 15 16 inch in the ten spot markets averaged 31.33 cents per pound on Friday, November 29, against 30.46 on Friday of last week and 24.12 a year ago.

The Country Doctor — His Tribe Is Vanishing



Fast fading from the American scene is the country doctor. The ranks of these hardy men who have contributed so much to the rich heritage of the American medical profession are growing smaller every year. As the old timers die or retire, few young doctors move in to take their place, since most modern medical school graduates establish in urban centers. With the shortage of rural doctors now a definite menace to the health of farm families, the State Medical Care Commission has put forth a plan which offers a solution to the problem. The Good Health Association has undertaken to acquaint the people of the State with the Medical Care plan and the urgent need for its adoption.

Hatchery Production Trailing Last Year

North Carolina commercial hatcheries produced approximately 593,000 chicks during September, according to the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service. This production is 57 per cent less than the 1,118,000 chicks hatched during the same month last year and 13 per cent less than the five-year (1940-44) average.

At the present time the demand for chicks for commercial broiler production exceeds the output, which is partly due to the limited supply of hatching eggs. The supply of hatching eggs is gradually improving, however, and with pullets coming into production, hatching eggs should be plentiful in a few months.

For the first nine months of this year (January to September inclusive), commercial hatcheries produced approximately 27,295,000 chicks. This compares with a production of 32,774,000 chicks for the same period in 1945.

Get Nitrogen Cheap From Soybean Crop

Soybeans, grown in rotation with tobacco on coarse sandy loam soils, have proved a satisfactory source of nitrogen for the tobacco.

Tests run by the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station, in which this was studied, have shown that the yield of tobacco following the soybeans averaged 1,404 pounds per acre for the seven-year period of the test. This tobacco had an average value of \$480.12 per acre, with an average price per 100 pounds of \$34.20. As the prices indicate, say tobacco research workers located at the Oxford Tobacco Branch Station who conducted the work, the quality of the

leaf was superior, when grown following the soybeans.

In the rotation tested, oats followed the tobacco. After the oats were cut for hay, the soybeans were broadcast on the land. When the beans were mature, they were harvested for seed, and the remainder of the soybean plants were disked and plowed under in the fall. Rye followed the soybeans and was plowed under in the spring before the tobacco was set.

The fertilizer treatment used with this rotation ranged from 0-10-6 to 0-10-12 and 0-10-24, the research workers report. They point out that caution should be used in fertilizing the tobacco in this rotation because if the tobacco gets too much nitrogen the quality of the cured leaf is apt to be lowered.

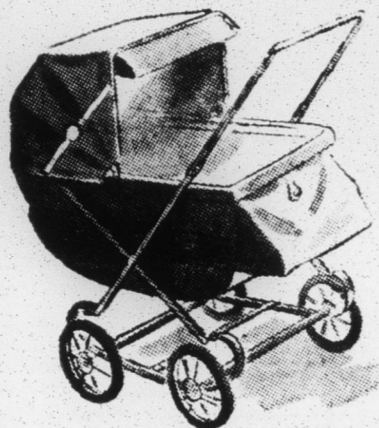

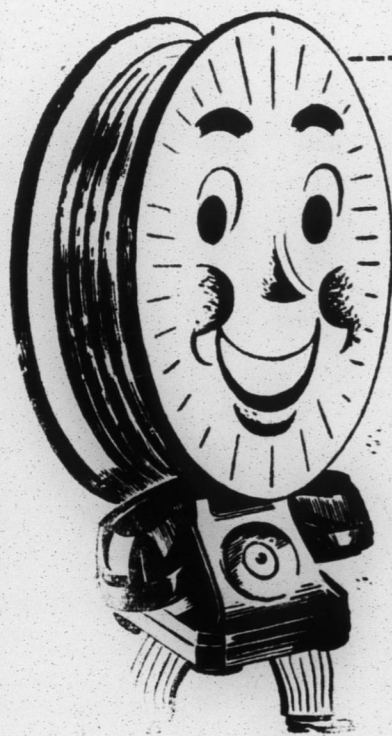
