#### Manager Says Financial **Damage Amounts to** Over \$2,000

Rural electrification in Chowan County is being blocked by action tak en by Edenton's Water & Light De partment, it was charged early this week by A. T. Lane of Hertford manager of the Albemarle Electric Membership Corporation. 'Mr. Lane stated that Edenton is one of the first county seats in North Carolina to fight its county rural electrification program.

'The Town of Edenton's Water and Light Department is setting poles side by side with the Rural Electric Membership Cooperative lines, which have been completed for 60 days, except for the stringing of the hard to get' conductor," said Mr. Lane. "This conductor was promised to be shipped by the manufacturer in April of this year, but due to strikes, which shut down all copper mills for more than six months, they were unable to meet their shipping schedule.

"According to records copied by REA officials from Albemarle Electric Membership Coop files in their office in Hertford, on October 16, 1945, there was a meeting held in the Edenton Water and Light, Department's office.
