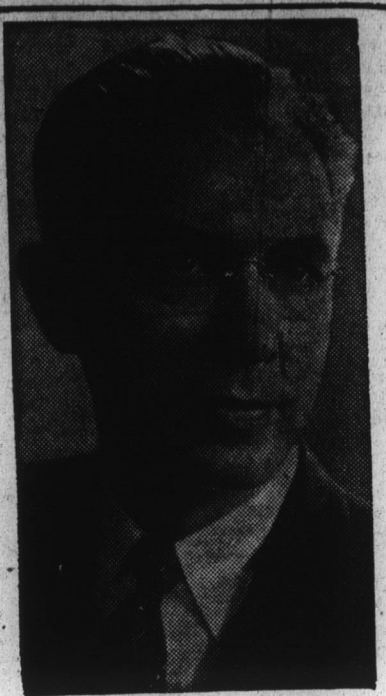

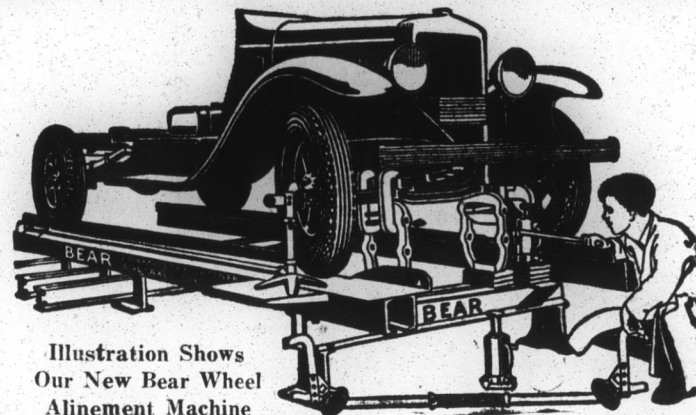


Illustration Shows Our New Bear Wheel Alinement Machine
