District Contest Held In Hertford; 12 Counties In Competition

The District 4-H Dress Revue was held in Hertford at the Agricultural Building on September 20, with 12 counties competing. Winner of the revue was Miss Edith Rogerson of Martin County, who wore a gray chambray dress. She made her accessories of matching material.

Among the blue award winners was Audrey Pearce of Edenton, who wore a pink pique suit, a fitted jacket with large white cuffs of matching material and a gored skirt. She used white accessories. Other blue award

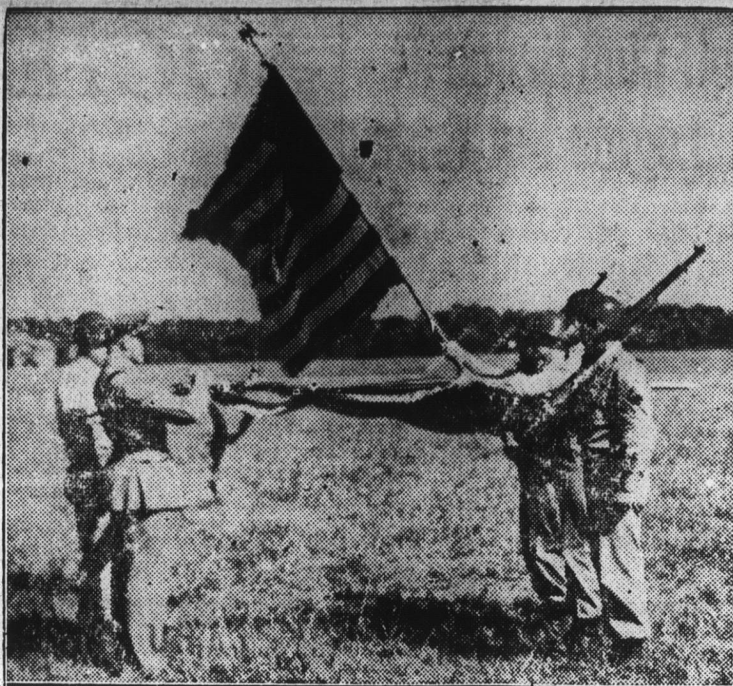
winners were Marilyn Carter of Pasquotank County, and Carolyn Hurdle of Perquimans County. Audrey Pearce also won the county medal for having the best 4-H clothing achievement records.

The district winners will enter the State contest and compete with district winners from all over the State. State prizes for the dress revue and clothing achievement are free trips to Chicago in December. Two \$25 cash prizes will be given for the best individual clothing achievement. This contest was introduced this year and has not yet been added to the national contests.

Present to judge the contest were Miss Mary Sue Moser, assistant State 4-H Club leader; Miss Julia McIver and Miss Jane Gibbs, clothing specialists of the State Extension Service.

Counties in this district are Dare, Currituck, Camden, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Chowan, Martin, Gates, Washington, Bertie, Tyrrell and Hyde.

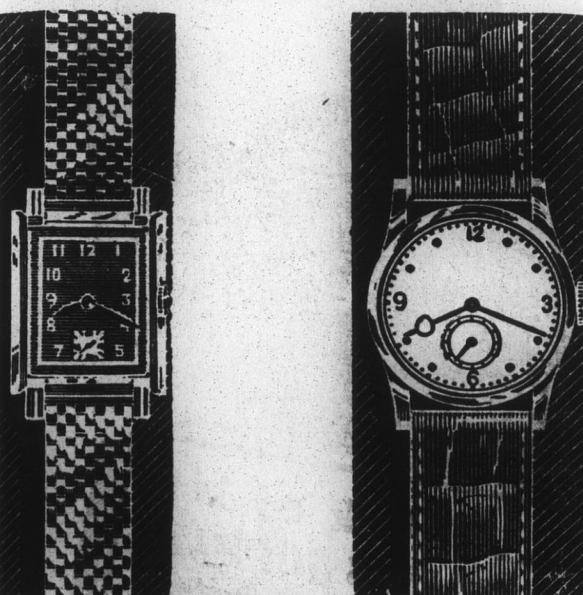
