

New Provisions In Cotton Law

Application for Increase Must Be Filed By April 21

New cotton legislation recently passed by Congress provides for minimum 1950 acreage allotments based on one of three provisions, J. M. Price, Secretary to the county PMA committee, said this week.

The revised allotments are based on the larger of (1) 65 per cent of the average acreage planted in cotton (or devoted to war crops in place of cotton) in 1946, 1947 and 1948; (2) 45 per cent of the highest acreage planted to cotton (or devoted to war crops in place of cotton) on the farm during any one of the three years; but (3) not more than 40 per cent of the 1949 acreage which was tilled on the farm or in regular rotation.

Any owner or operator of a cotton

farm in Chowan county who believes he is entitled to an acreage increase and wants to be considered by the county committee for possible allotment adjustment under the legislation must file an application not later than April 21, 1950.

"We urge owners or operators who want their farms considered for revised allotments to file applications by this date," Mr. Price said. "Farmers who are satisfied with their present allotments need not file applications. However, those desiring increases will be considered by the county committee after applications for such increases are filed in the county office."

Each operator of a farm for which an application is filed will receive a notice from the county committee of the revised 1950 cotton acreage allotment. When the new allotment notice is mailed it will replace any previous 1950 allotment notice already received by the farm operator. Application forms may be obtained from the county PMA office.

Veterans Eligible For Disability Pensions

Disability Need Not Result From Military Service

Veterans of World War I or II who have become unable to follow a gainful occupation because of disability may be entitled to receive a pension even though the disability did not result from military service.

Rules and regulations governing pensions payable for non-service connected disabilities have been liberalized which affords older veterans an opportunity to qualify for total disability benefits even though the degree of disability may not be total. Many veterans who have been denied total disability benefits in the past may be eligible to apply again.

A veteran must have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable after serving a minimum of 90 days service, or unless discharged sooner for line of duty disability.

Single veterans whose annual in-

come is \$1,000 or more, or veterans with dependents whose annual income is over \$2,500 cannot qualify.

The rate payable is \$60 per month, increased to \$72 per month on attainment of age 65 or after continuous receipt for ten years.

Veterans with disabilities limiting their employment should contact Jasper L. Wiggins, Chowan County Service Officer, Edenton or the office of the North Carolina Veterans Commission, 206 Kramer Building, Elizabeth City, North Carolina, immediately for advice and assistance in completing applications for disability benefits.
