This year's average yield per acre was the second largest since the 4-H Club peanut contest was started six years ago. The largest yield was made in 1948, when it was 2,165 pounds.

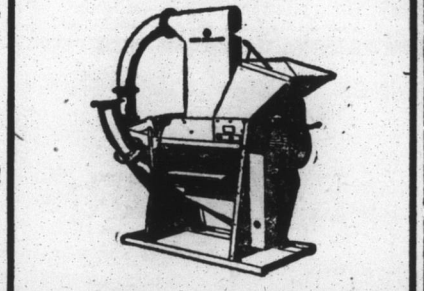
