

The first Nursing Home in North Carolina for terminal care of indigent cancer patients was formerly dedicated at exercises held at the site of the Home near Lumberton Sunday, March 23. Opening of this home, which has a capacity for 60 patients, is regarded as another important step in the rapidly expanding program of the North Carolina Division of the American Cancer Society, of which Mrs. George E. Marshall of Mount Airy is the State Commander and Executive Vice-President.

The Nursing Home will occupy a wing of the Robeson County Health Center and Welfare Department, pictured above, and will be known as the North Carolina Cancer Institute. It will be one of only four such homes in the United States.
