

## Extension Agents Help In Planning For Better Homes

### Russell Byrum Family Add Convenience By Various Changes

"Making a Home More Liveable and Convenient" is the plan of Mr. and Mrs. Russell H. Byrum of the Enterprise community. This farm family decided to make some improvements by some remodeling and addition to their dwelling. The plan involved the enlargement of a small room now used for a den, the installation of a bathroom, and the enlargement of the kitchen. A utility room was to be built separate and apart from the dwelling. They called on the county and home agents for assistance. With the assistance of Extension Agents the enlargement of the den was planned as desired. There being no other available space in the house without materially upsetting the structure, the bathroom was planned to take the place of a pantry and back porch adjoining the dining room and close to the stairway. The kitchen was planned for maximum convenience. Instead of planning a breakfast nook to take up part of the proposed back porch such space was provided in the kitchen for eating. The space in the kitchen was planned to accommodate the stove, refrigerator and other pieces of equipment with adequate cabinet space for maximum convenience. Instead of having a back porch and utility room separate and apart from the house a glassed-in utility room will be built on to the kitchen and the space for the facilities was planned. Closet space and pantry space was planned. The Byrums have taken much time to think over and carefully plan these additions for maximum convenience and liveability. The plan is theirs

though they greatly appreciated the suggestions of the Extension Agents and have used many of them, they feel, to a definite advantage over their original plan. The construction is underway and the Byrums are very happy with their plan thus far. The Extension Agents are always ready and willing to help farm people in planning homes, remodeling homes or other buildings for maximum service and convenience. They do not attempt to tell anyone what to do but rather offer suggestions which in many cases cover things that the owner had not thought of.

### Ober Successful With Bee Colony

Paul Ober of the Rocky Hock community is doing nicely with his colony of bees recently started. The five-

pound package of Italian bees have been fed properly and upon examination last week were found to have several frames loaded with young brood. Mr. Ober informed the County Agent, C. W. Overman, in the beginning that he was afraid of bees and didn't know whether he would be able to work with them or not. To his amazement he has been able to work with the bees without the need of veil or gloves or even the use of a smoker, although he keeps these at finger tip when working with them so that they will be ready, if needed. Mr. Ober says that there has not been a single bee to go on a sit down strike yet, which means he hasn't gotten a sting yet. This colony is placed in the edge of the woods by the cantaloupe and watermelon patch to improve pollination as well as to make honey.

### Good Start Made With Bee Colonies

Ellie D. Byrum of the Center Hill community is off to a good start with his three colonies of bees. About a week ago a complete new brood chamber was placed into one of the hives but on the visit of County Agent C. W. Overman last week found that the colony had not started working on the new equipment. Mr. Byrum was assisted in installing brood foundations in two more new brood chambers. The other two colonies were transferred to the new equipment and given one or two frames of young brood each as a start. As transferred, the old hives were placed to one side with enough bees remaining to rear the brood in them. As soon as the young bees have emerged these will be transferred to the new colony also and then the old hives will be disposed of.
