Laundering Foundation Garments

Since soil and perspiration tend to water and mild soap suds, using a vice, rot fibers, frequent laundering of brush on straps if necessary. Hang foundation garments will help save brassieres over the line to dry to use a brush on soiled spots. Never wring a girdle. Roll it in a Turkish towel and knead to remove

excess moisture. Unwrap immediately and smooth out wrinkles. To dry, hang by garters—away from heat. Press the fabric panels, but never iron elasticized sections.

Laundering Lingerie

Wash quickly in bowl full of rich, mild suds. Equeeze suds through garnents, never twist or rub with cake Roll in a Turkish towel to oap. help dry them quickly. Dry away from direct heat. Press on wrong ered rod, allowing a third of the stockside while still damp, using a moderately warm iron.






