### **Vets Question Box**

Q-I am a World War I veteran Must I include this money in figuring out whether my total yearly income is

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below the ceiling for getting a pension for a total nonservice-conne isability?

A-Civil Service retirement payments count as income until you have received the full amount you have contributed under the program. After that, the retirement payments are not considered, in computing income for pension purposes.

Q-Are there any cases in which GI loan guarantee can be restored to a veteran's credit?

A—Yes, under the following conditions: If the property is destroyed by fire or other natural hazard; if it has been taken over for public use by the Federal or local government, or it it must be disposed of because of other compelling reasons such as change of employment or illness, not the fault of the veteran. VA, however, must be free from liability on the original



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
