tion for the police. With the police moving from their present quarters, the idea was advanced that Edenton needs an incinerator. The present trash pile has outlived its usefulness, with the site filled up and the nearby creek being gradually encroached upon, thus helping to retard the flow of water after heavy rains. Too, there has been no little complaint in that section of town on account of offensive odors from the trash pile as well as the large number of rats which breed there. With a stack already available, it was stated that a goodly portion of the expense of an incinerator would be saved.

W. H. Oakley, Jr., of Hertford appeared at the meeting in behalf of Charlie Jernigan, whose certificate of public conveyance was revoked in November after a liquor conviction in court. Mr. Oakley asked for renewal of the certificate, but the councilmen decided to wait until the June meeting to consider the case.

The councilmen amended an ordinance relating to peddling and soliciting orders at private residences. This amendment requires peddlers to obtain a permit. The permit must be obtained from the Chief of Police.

Town Clerk Ernest Ward was instructed to write a letter to proper postal authorities relative to providing an adequate driveway at the Post Office, where present space does not permit large mail trucks to drive off the street.

The Street Department was instructed to place concrete in front of the Post Office from the curb to the sidewalk the width of the building. The Street Department was also instructed to continue investigation for a remedy of flooded conditions at the Chas. H. Jenkins Motor Company.

Though the councilmen transacted a goodly amount of business the meeting adjourned before 10 o'clock.

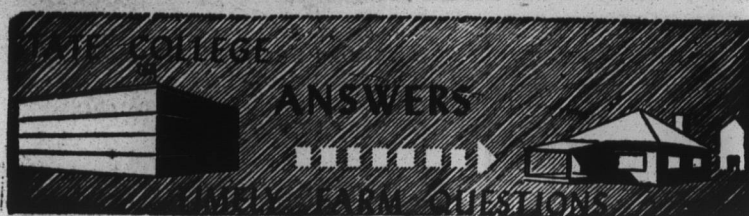

Question: What is the purpose of the annual State Farm Census?

Answer: The main purpose of the State Farm Census, now in its 13th year, is to meet the local demand for annual county statistics on agriculture in greater geographic detail than has been provided by any other service. The Federal agricultural census does not provide data by counties at sufficiently frequent intervals to meet the statistical needs of the county and State agricultural agencies, and other users of this service.

There is a strong demand for agricultural statistics covering farming operations on the county level. This information is requested and used by individuals, public agencies, and by local groups as well as State and national organizations. The annual collection of county farm facts enables agricultural workers at all levels to prepare effective farm programs which are in the interest of the farmers' welfare. In a basically agricultural State any improvement in the economic well-being of farmers means an improved economic status for all other citizens as well.

The State Farm Census provides the only satisfactory basis for compiling reliable annual county estimates of crop acreages and other farm facts. Thus the increasing demand for annual county estimates of crop acreages and other farm facts. Thus the increasing demand for annual county estimates of the acreage and production of all crops is being met. The need for reliable county estimates is especially emphasized by acreage allotment and control programs. These programs can be more fairly administered where annual Farm Census records are available.

LUMBERJACK JUMBO

3 slices bacon 1 medium onion, chopped
 1 No. 303 can CS yellow whole kernel corn 1 green pepper, sliced
 1 No. 2 can red kidney beans 2 teaspoons chili powder
 1 No. 2 can Redgate tomatoes 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/4 lb. American cheese, grated

Cut bacon in 1/2-inch pieces, fry crisp; drain well. Save 2 tablespoons fat. Drain canned vegetables. Add vegetable liquids with onion and green pepper to bacon fat. Cook until liquid is reduced to about half. Add all ingredients except cheese and heat. Reduce heat; add cheese. Stir until melted. Makes 6 servings.
