



in their pastures which to be eating particularly the clover. A sample of these worms was collected from the pasture of Jarvis Winslow of Yeopim Community and

sent in for identification. The entomologist advises an application of 20 pounds of 5 per cent DDT dust per acre and keeping the animals off the pasture two to three weeks after the treatment. The entomologist identified these worms as larvae of the crane fly which feed on decaying organic matter and seld-om, if ever, feed on green plants. He does not think that these worms are doing any damage to the pasture.
