WORMS ATTACK CLOVER

A few farmers have reported worms in their pastures which they believed to be eating particularly the clover. A sample of these worms was collected from the pasture of Jarvis Winslow of Yeopim Community and sent in for identification.

The entomologist advises an application of 20 pounds of 5 per cent DDT dust per acre and keeping the animals off the pasture two to three weeks after the treatment. The entomologist identified these worms as larvae of the crane fly which feed on decaying organic matter and seldom, if ever, feed on green plants. He does not think that these worms are doing any damage to the pasture.

Town Councilmen Will Buy Bleachers

(Continued from Page One) fire fighting. It was stated that Fire Marshal Brockwell stands ready at any time to send an engineer if and when a new fire station is erected in order to make a thorough study of the most advantageous location.

Mr. Yates was instructed to continue his work in an effort to secure the approximate cost of erecting a new fire station.

John A. Holmes, Thomas Cheers and Philip McMullan appeared at the meeting in the interest of sidewalks and curbing in front of the two colored schools and the Junior-Senior High School. A request was also made to construct a hand-surfaced street between the baseball park and the school building from Oakum Street to Armory Street. It was pointed out that such a road would be a big help hauling coal and supplies to the school, the street now being in such shape that cars frequently get stuck. School teachers could also park along the street, thus eliminating congestion on Armory Avenue. A request was also made to install lights near the entrance of the colored and white schools. Graham Byrum and J. Edwin Bufflap were appointed to confer with

committees from the school trustees to see what might be done regarding the improvements.

During the meeting Town Councilmen heard complaints aimed at the Teen Age Club in the colored section. It was reported that at times groups of young people become boisterous, crowd the sidewalks and use obscene language which creates a nuisance in the neighborhood. The Councilmen will confer with the Town Attorney relative to the possibility of recommending action by the Grand Jury.

Town Council complied with a request from the Edenton Merchants Committee for an appropriation of \$100 to be used for postage in answering mail ordinarily handled by a Chamber of Commerce.

The Councilmen also voted to pay David Holton \$22.50 freight charges for removing the temporary bleachers at Hicks Field back to Wake Forest. The bleachers were loaned by Coach Jim Weaver. Town Clerk Ernest Ward, Jr., was instructed to write a letter of appreciation to Coach Weaver for loaning the bleachers. Mr. Ward was also instructed to write a letter of appreciation to VFW Post, No. 9280, for the invitation extended to the formal dedication of the new post home.

The Councilmen went on record to request the State Highway Commission to install curb and gutter on West Queen Street when the highway is widened.

J. Edwin Bufflap and J. Clarence

Leary were instructed to investigate a request for pipe to drain water, made by T. B. Williford.

W. J. Yates, John Mitchener and Town Attorney J. N. Pruden were instructed to confer with M. W. Jackson relative to a right of way on the Jackson property on which there are now several houses.

The Street Department was instructed to clean up the area next to the hospital so that grass and trash can be burned by the Fire Department. The Street Department was also instructed to pipe the ditch leading from the Farmers Exchange to the culvert crossing North Broad Street.

Fire Chief R. K. Hall reported six fire alarms in February, four in Edenton and two in the rural section. No damage occurred.
