

4-H Members Study Damage To Cotton

Plan to Make a Square Count Once a Week For Several Weeks

Two national 4-H award programs of special interest to girls have been approved for 1953 by the State Extension Service. They are the bread demonstration and dress revue.

Objectives of the demonstration program are to help 4-H Club girls acquire the skills involved in making breads, rolls and other baked food. Participants learn to give effective demonstrations showing some phase of what has been learned and its relation to the family dietary needs.

In the dress revue program, which is open to all girls participating in the 4-H clothing program, members learn to dress appropriately in keeping with a well-planned family budget, and to develop poise, proper posture and habits of good grooming. The popularity of this program is reflected in the enrollment of girls last year which totaled 669,259.

County Extension agents will furnish complete information concerning these programs.

(Continued from Page One) motor trips to reduce the temptation to speed, the Council offered these tips to drivers:

1. Obey common sense as well as legal speed limits.
2. Keep your car under control at all times, so you can stop quickly if circumstances demand.
3. Keep fresh and alert at the wheel. You can't make split-second decisions if you're tired and fuzzy.
4. Keep a safe, clear stopping distance between you and the car ahead. Watch cars behind in your rear-view mirror.
5. Signal for turns well before turning. Avoid abrupt stops.
6. Slow down at sundown, and be sure you can stop within the range of your lights.

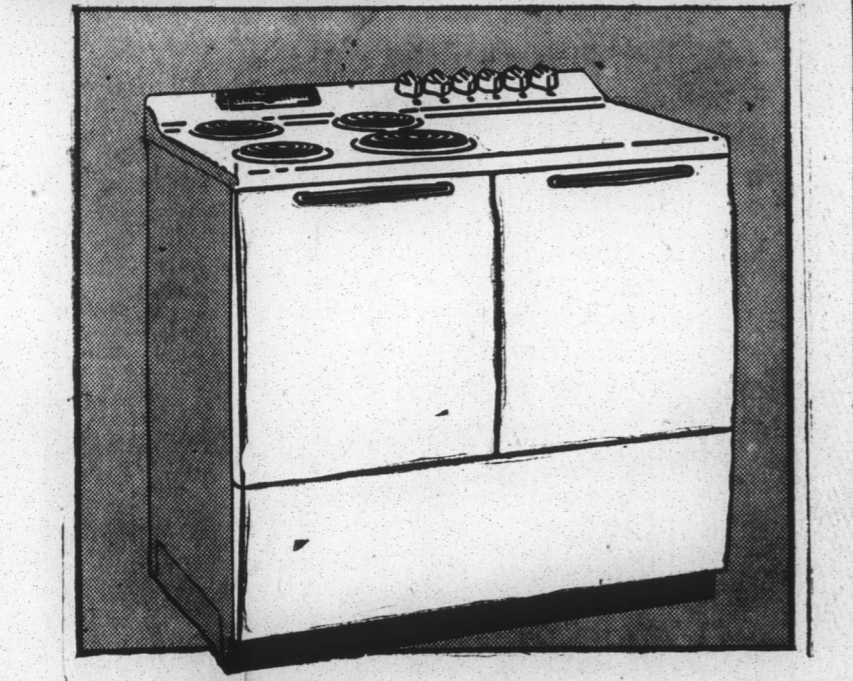
