

# C. Of C. Convention August 27 And 28 Over 200 Are Expected To Gather at Chapel Hill

The sixteenth annual convention of the Children of the Confederacy of the North Carolina Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, will convene at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, Thursday and Friday, August 27 and 28, with the Cornelia Spencer Chapter, C. of C. as host and Miss Betty Lee of Durham, president, presiding.

Over 200 young people from all over North Carolina are scheduled to attend and give reports of the year's activities. These groups are interested in true history of the South. They have a five-point program of benevolence, historical, memorial, patriotic, and social. They contribute to the maintenance of three beds in three tubercular hospitals in North Carolina; to the Confederate Woman's Home and Nurses in Fayetteville; maintain two scholarships, the Holt and Wallace at Woman's College in Greensboro; as well as contributing to the General Winnie Davis Scholarship which is open to children over the United States; and now the main project is contributing to a Memorial Building Fund which will build a home in memory of the Women of the 60's in Richmond, Virginia. In many towns and cities these young people lead in assisting with community, Red Cross, Heart, Cancer, and March of Dimes Drives.

This organization has as its Five-Pointed Star of Life: to Do, to Dare, to Love, to Live, and to Pray; and stress these principles in their everyday activities. This year there are sixty-seven Chapter and Essay Prizes being offered with three hundred ninety five dollars remunerations. Already over five thousand children have participated and these prizes will be awarded at this Convention.

Registration will be from ten to four in the Naval Armory in Chapel Hill, August 27. There will be a Planetarium Show and tour of the University at 3 o'clock, a courtesy of the Extension Department of the University. A banquet will be held at the Carolina Inn at 7 o'clock. A dance will follow in the armory at 9 o'clock. During intermission at ten thirty, the Leonidas Polk Chapter U. D. C. and the Cornelia Spencer Chapter C. of C. will entertain at a reception in the armory. Dancing will be until twelve with Mason Wilkins and his "Starlighters" Orchestra furnishing the music. On Friday, a business session will be held from nine to twelve with

Miss Betty Lee, president, presiding. Reports will be given and an election of officers will be held. During the luncheon at 1 o'clock, a public speaking and vocal music contests will be held, and prizes awarded in these fields.

### 4-H CLUB CORN DAMAGED

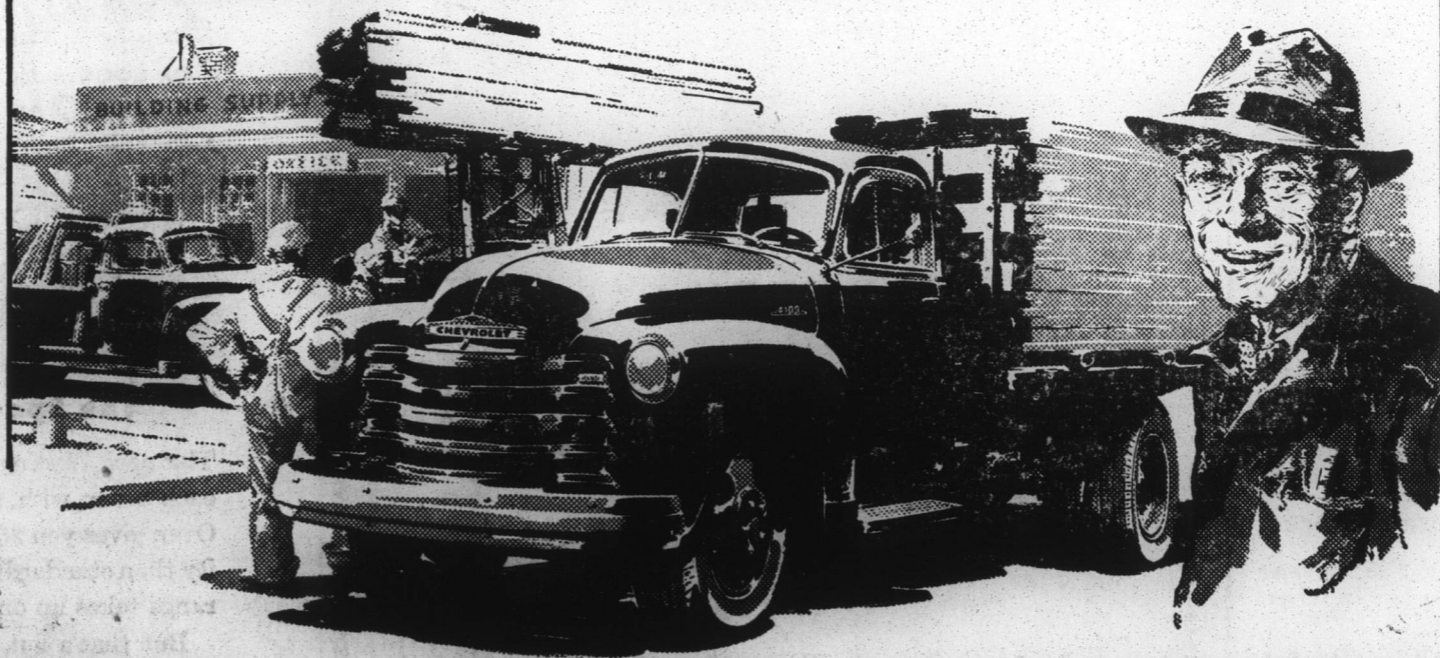
