Conviction for violating the brush burning law is punishable by a fine of up to \$50, or improsinment for not more than 30 days, the ranger said.

The county ranger pointed out that the new brush burning law does not apply to any fires started or caused to be started within 100 feet of an occupied dwelling house. This mere ly means no permit is required when such fires are started or caused to be started within 100 feet of a dwelling

Because of the unusually dry Summer and early Fall, forests in the county, the ranger said, are rather 11. dry and much care should be exercised by any person handling fire in 12. or near any wooded area.

Campers, hunters, fishermen, mo-torists, and hikers are urged to be sure to douse all campfires, crush out all lighted cigarettes and cigars, and 15. not throw lighted live ashes anywhere they might ignite dry woods.




