The purpose of the school he listed as follows:

Service to the community; Second, to provide children with the basic elements of education—these elements being (1) The three R's (Reading, Rithmetic, Rithmetic), (2) To live and work together under community law (good citizenship) this being a responsibility to be shared by parent, teacher and school alike, (3) Vocational Guidance—help students plan a future.

He then discussed the accomplishments of school students. Saying that enough emphasis is being put on athletics and vocational education. And since the schools are what we demand of them, we should let it be known that the constant swing from vocational to classic should be stopped, and the installation of the three R's begun.

Likewise a request to pipe a ditch on Badham Road was tabled, but a dangerous condition was cited at Badham Road and Second Street.

Chief of Police George Dail called attention to the condition of the police car. At present repairs to the car will amount to over \$500. Bids were received, the lowest being for a Chevrolet by the B.B.H. Motor Company.

Before the meeting adjourned Mayor Haskett appealed for two members to attend the annual meeting of the N. C. League of Municipalities in Asheville October 18, 19 and 20. The probability is that Mayor Haskett and Clerk Ernest Ward will attend.

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

ARABIAN CASSEROLE

4 lean pork chops, cut 1-inch thick 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 medium onion Dash pepper
1 green pepper 1 No. 3 can Reddipe tomatoes
1/4 cup rice 1/2 cup water

If necessary trim chops to remove excess fat. Brown chops on both sides in hot skillet. Remove from heat. Cut onion in 4 thick slices. Place one slice on each chop. Cut green pepper into 4 rings. Remove seeds and place on top of onion. Sprinkle rice, salt and pepper over top. Brown up tomatoes slightly and add the water. Gently pour over rice. Cover tightly; bake in slow oven, 225 degrees, 1 1/2 hours. If too moist, remove cover last 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
