

Tobacco Specialist Talks To Farmers

Meeting Held at Chowan Community Building

Latest information on tobacco production was presented to growers at a tobacco meeting held Thursday morning at the Chowan Community Building. Extension tobacco specialist, Sam Hawks, presented the information illustrated with projected slides.

Mr. Hawks emphasized special care in growing plants. Gas treatment of beds prevents weeds, controls nematodes and may be done now. Beds may be seeded after 48 hours of aeration. Beds should be fertilized and prepared for seeding prior to treatment. He pointed out the necessity of watering beds when they need it, particularly when the seed are sprouting.

Dixie Bright 101 is still one of the best varieties for black shank infested soil, Mr. Hawks said. Coker 139 looks very good based upon one year's trials at the Experiment Station.

Tobacco soils should be tested to determine lime and fertilizer needs. Generally 900 pounds of 4-8-10 per acre is about right. Fertilizer should be put out about and thoroughly mixed with the soil about two weeks before setting plants.

Mr. Hawks urged fumigation of soil where nematodes are apparently present. The soil fumigant should be applied eight to ten inches below the soil surface level. Fumigant should be applied at least two weeks before setting plants.

Irrigation, where needed and properly done, pays good dividends. Specific recommendations should be followed in irrigating tobacco.

Minutes Of County Board Of Education

The Board of Education held its regular meeting in the office of the Superintendent, January 3, at 10:00 A. M. The following members were present: G. B. Potter, Carey Evans, J. I. Boyce, D. H. Berryman, G. E. Nixon and Corroy Perry. The chairman, Mr. Potter called

the meeting to order by having the secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting. The minutes were read, and same adopted by a motion made and passed.

The reports of the local school fund treasurer and the County treasurer were read, and same accepted by a motion made and passed.

The Superintendent reported that the 1954 school audit had been received and copies distributed according to requirements. After a review and statements of satisfaction by the Superintendent, a motion was made and passed to accept the report, and authorized payment of same when the Financial Statement was filed.

The Superintendent requested the Board to designate the Saturday in which to make up the regular school day lost December 6 on account of weather conditions. A motion was made that the day of December 6, be made up Saturday, January 15.

The Board voted in favor of the North Carolina School Board Association to form a delegate body to administer the affairs of the Association.

The Superintendent read the resolution passed by the State Board of Education December 2, 1954, with respect to all school personnel concerned with safe school transportation.

The bills paid since last meeting were approved by a motion made and passed in the amount of \$6,851.71 are as follows:

Edenton City Unit, new edifica, \$3,482.16; capital outlay, \$527.55; current expense, \$2,788.68; veterans program, \$313.92; vocational teachers' salary and travel, \$740.00; total \$6,851.71.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned.
