the burdens of the world was just exhibiting one of the traits that makes him one of the best-liked and most respected coaches in the State. He simply hates to lose. Therefore, in his business, where nothing pays off but a winner, he has geared himself to win. And, through application of his well-taught knowledge, his past two teams have done him proud. But it all blew up Friday night. And there wasn't a dry eye that left the stadium on its way back to Edenton.

Coach Billings gave a set of officials that he classed as "incompetent" credit for taking a lot of the fight out of his team and indirectly bringing about the circumstances that turned a 12-point lead into a one-point defeat.

He pointed out several instances of questionable calls that brought on his 15-yard penalties that nullified a touchdown and a 40-yard gain on a pass play did the trick in the first half. And then, Billings says, the slow, faltering manner in which the officials kept the contest moving hurt his players. He also quoted one of his players as saying that Cary's second touchdown wasn't really a touchdown at all. He said

that one of his defensive standouts claimed that Cary was halted with about six inches to go for a touchdown on fourth down in the third period. Billings said that his player told him that he had his hand on the ball, holding it at least six inches away from the Edenton goal in the middle of a pileup that halted a Cary line pounce. He said that the official covering the pileup ordered the players to "get up"; instead of physically untangling the pileup to correctly ascertain the position of the ball—a service usually performed by more conscientious officials.

Billings says that his player said that upon hearing the official's command to "get up", he wriggled himself free from the pileup, confident that the White Imps' drive had been halted. But, to his, and several of the other Aces' amazement, when the pileup was untangled the ball was across the goal.

The little coach said that this instance took a lot of fight out of his boys, and seconds later the play made it possible for Cary to go ahead when the game-winning point after touchdown was made.

Then, with the pressure of the ever-shortening time bearing down on them, the Aces took the ball on their own 19, and drove to the Cary seven, where Edenton's last march

of the 1955 season fizzled. Quarterback Stuart Holland went down under a pair of defenders when attempting to pass, and all of Edenton's dreams of a second straight state championship went down with him.

So, Billings and one of the finest squads in Edenton's history, came to a bitter ending of a very successful campaign. Playing their last contest for Edenton were Holland, Tommy Bass, Wayne Keeter, Al Ward, Clarence Lupton, Chan Wilson, Terry Bennett, Gary Dail, Bobby Pratt and Larry Tynch.

"Wait 'til next year," though, is a cry that can't be muffled in Edenton. Coach Billings has the nucleus of a good team returning and though it may not even approach his last two teams, you can bet that he will again make Edenton proud of its football squad.

All that will be lacking will be a quarterback, a fullback and a couple of linemen, and Billings will probably find suitable replacements to again make Edenton a contender—at least in its own class.

Returning will be backs Bobby Ashley, Billy Bunch, Jerry Downum, Ray Hollowell and Bruce White; Ends Jack Bunch, John Kramer, Wayne Emminizer and Sid White; Tackles Jesse Copeland, Dave Fletcher, Don Roche and Dallas Stallings; Guards Ralph Chapell, Carl Forehand, Billy Harry and Richard Canipe, and Centers Eddie George, Sherwood Harrell and Johnny Speight. Starters from this year's team are Halfbacks Bunch and Downum, Ends Kramer and Emminizer, Tackle Fletcher, Guard Canipe, and Center Speight.

So, maybe as Coach Billings was thoughtfully kicking at pebbles on the lawn beside the Edenton school, his thoughts were turned toward the future, and days of victory instead of remembering the defeat that broke the Aces' hearts Friday night at Greenville.
